is a Grammy
Award-
winning com-

poser and an accomplished singer, songwriter, and musician. No one fuses traditional Jewish melodies with the power and rhythm of modern popular music like he does. He performs more than 100 concerts each year. Blessed with a warm and expressive voice, Doug's sensitive and penetrating interpretations of liturgy as well as his insightful and humorous songs about Jewish events and heroes have placed him in the forefront of contemporary Jewish music. Few performers possess Doug's talents as a com-

poser, and few composers can jam with the very best players. Doug's symphony, *The Golem*, was performed by the Seattle Philharmonic Orchestra, and he has also toured and played country, pop, and rock music with such well-known artists as John Denver, Jerry Jeff Walker, and Mason Williams. Doug has recorded six original Jewish music albums, with his 1984 Grammy being awarded for writing "Manhunt", a powerful song featured in the smash album and movie, *Flashdance*. He also has two songbooks containing all the songs from four of his recordings.

When Doug's father passed away, he assumed his father's position as Cantor at a large reform congregation near San Francisco. Doug is currently the Cantorial Soloist at Congregation Or Ami in Calabasas, California. He earned a degree in Philosophy from St. John's College in Santa Fe, New Mexico. From the President

In November, Temple Beth El will conduct the contractual requirement to review Rabbi Zukrow. I am establishing the Rabbi/Temple Liaison committee. The committee is composed of four members. Two members selected by the Rabbi and two members appointed by the President and approved by our Board of Directors. The President of the Temple serves as Chairman of the Committee, but is a non-voting member. The members of the committee are Alan Bookman, Fred Levin, Wendy Ochs and Susan Sacks.

The committee shall provide feedback to the Rabbi on the manner and degree to which he is implementing the following five categories (the descriptions following each subject area are meant only as examples and are not to be limitations on the subject):

A. Preaching (leading Temple worship and preparing sermons, presiding at weddings, funerals, Bar/Bat Mitz-

vahs, and Confirmation)

B. Pedagogy (service as an educational resource both within and outside the Temple)

C. Pastoral Care (visits to the sick, elderly, bereaved, others in similar need, and counseling of congregants)

D. Public Relations (representing the Temple to the larger community)

E. Priestly Functions (providing prayers or invocations of a ceremonial nature where rabbinic services may not necessarily be required).

I can not emphasize enough that the Rabbi/Temple Liaison committee needs your input. Call the members or write them a note. Their phone numbers can be found in the directory that was mailed out recently. Please try to prepare and share your input prior to November 12th.

While in the Navy, I was evaluated yearly and I also evaluated

others. I felt that this process, while difficult, served to provide feedback on how people were doing, both good and bad. Now that I am in business I tell my customers, if there is something we should do differently, I only know about it if you tell me. This is your opportunity to be heard. Your specific input is desired.

ELEMENTARY
SCHOOL
PROFILE

46 HOMELESS CHILDREN attend Hallmark. They live with multiple families in single dwellings, motels, campgrounds, shelters, even damaged home sites. One family lives in a church storefront and one at Loaves and Fishes. A group of 12 people live in a two-bedroom house. Hallmark has a free and reduced lunch population of 98%. Hallmark has been a failing school since the 2004-05 school year. Under the leadership of principal, Sheree Cagle, the school received an "A" in the 2008-09 school year.

Shop the gift shop and get a 30% discount. Under the management of Marty Lisner and her committee, everything is on sale. Let Marty know about your Judaic wants and needs. Yes, bar and bat mitzvah cards have been ordered! Thanks, Marty, for taking on this job. **She claims it's easy because she has such a good team!**

We know there has been a problem with our communication and are trying to solve it. Members without email will be getting event flyers in the mail. If you have not been getting informed about sisterhood events, let Karen Zukrow or me know.

Ask Liz McCulley about inner-city school Hallmark Elementary, and you will have to sit down. She is passionate about helping the kids who go there and their **families. She can't tell you enough about their needs and how Sisterhood helps them with our annual grant of \$1,000.** Liz spends about \$100 a month to fill their pantry, which was created not just for hungry children but their entire family. Says **Liz: "The school officials realize the grave situation of the parents as they try desperately to find employment. The principal, Sheree Cagle and her staff attempt to eliminate the struggle for food, so parents can focus on other parental responsibilities."**

The Sisterhood grant goes **into the principal's discretionary fund.** The fund

allows Dr. Cagle to draw funds without a written requisition to the board. That would not help with urgent and immediate needs. **Explains Liz: "As families are**

confronted with making the choice whether to pay a power bill or pay to feed their children, Dr. Cagle monitors her parents' needs

on a case by case basis. She feels grateful that she can personally drive a mother down to Gulf Power with bill in hand and together they pay for the month's usage.

This is cash drawn from our donation. Without this discretionary account, she would have to go through quite a bit of red tape to help **these families in need."**

Sisterhood's grant comes from one member who gives \$500 every year. The rest comes from individual donations. Right now, we need \$250 to make our goal of \$1,000. If you would like to help, we welcome checks, which should be earmarked for Hallmark School. Hallmark also needs volunteers and mentors. Talk to Liz if **you're interested at 232-1358.** It would be a mitzvah to help.

This month we will have our Bingo Fund-raiser, November 21st. Last year I did not go and was sorry. Everyone said it was such great fun, such wonderful silliness. This year Sandie volunteered her husband Stu to get prizes **from merchants. "He's good at that," she said. Come and find out for yourself.** Everyone needs silliness in their

lives. At our luncheon, we will have a speaker from the Pensacola opera. Get informed and enjoy the fellowship of sisters.

November 4th I travel to Toronto to represent Sisterhood at the WRJ biennial where Tony Blair and Dr. Ruth are both speaking. Biennials are smorgasbords of learning—so many choices, so **little time. I'll be learning how to write a D'var Torah, attending a film festival, learning about budgets, among other things. Next month, I'll let you know what I learned and how it was to be in the majority—to be among hundreds of Jews.**

If you want to know **what's going on in the children's school, you can** show up on a Sunday, have a great breakfast with your kids, listen to the opening session and then visit classrooms. Or you can attend their committee meeting, which is what I did. Both Principal Wendi Ochs and her committee are passionate about providing our kids a meaningful Jewish experience in our holy community.

My grandchildren, who are becoming Jewish, love to go. When I ask the ten-year old what she likes, she says, without **prompting, "It's a community. New people are welcome. And I learn stuff." The eleven year old says: "We just don't talk about God and read the bible. We discuss things." They love learning Hebrew, too and going to Hebrew school on Wednesdays. They were sad when Jillian Lisner recently left to live in Texas, but are happy to have Dvora, Marty Lisner and David Tucker teach them.**

The committee talked about the importance of

Complete with food, music, dancing and tours of their sanctuary, the Pensacola Greek Festival is a must for locals and visitors to the area. I am always impressed that even the children are actively involved in this three day event. They dress in the costumes of Greece and dance to the wonderful music. And they all appear to be having as good a time as the people in the audience! It is wonderful that a culture can be passed from generation to generation with love and pride, ensuring that it continues forever.

We have the same opportunity with our children. And we should **be sure that we don't** neglect our heritage and traditions. Take advantage of all that the

Jewish community in Pensacola has to offer. Participate and get involved in planning when you are asked. These are opportunities for the entire family! Share them with your children so that they will pass them on to theirs and ensure the continuation of Jewish culture in Pensacola and beyond.

These recipes are from **the church's cookbook** entitled:

"Favorite Greek Recipes"

Daughters of Penelope, Pallas Chapter 34, Pensacola, Florida

Dolmathes *Stuffed Grape Leaves*

2lbs. lean ground beef
2 large onions, grated
1/2 c. minced parsley
1/2 c. long grain rice
2 egg whites
2 tsp. dried mint
Salt and pepper to taste
1 (2 lb.) jar grape leaves
2 quarts chicken broth

Combine all ingredients, except grape leaves and broth, and mix well. Rinse, drain and separate grape leaves. Cover bottom

of 4-quart saucepan with 4-5 leaves. Prepare rolls by placing one teaspoon of filling on bottom edge of each leaf. Fold over, fold in sides and roll up. Place closely together in even layers in saucepan. Add enough chicken broth to cover rolls. Place a small plate directly over rolls to weigh down. Cover and simmer for one hour. Remove rolls to a serving dish. Pour Avgolemono sauce over rolls.

Avgolemono Sauce
Creamy Egg and Lemon Sauce

2-3 cups chicken broth
2 eggs
2 egg yolks
1/3 c. lemon juice
1 Tbsp. cornstarch

In a small saucepan, boil broth. Combine eggs, yolks, lemon juice and cornstarch in blender. With machine running, slowly add hot chicken broth. Return contents of blender to saucepan. Stir over low heat until thickened.
