From the Rabbi

“The Time to Prepare is Now!”

It is traditional to make New Year resolutions. As Jews, we made commitments on Rosh Hashanah. At that time I entreated you to make a commitment to your health and well-being. With the new secular year, I encourage you to focus on the following task:

Today, right now, we all must complete our:

1. Advance Health Care Directive
2. Living Will
3. Designation of a Health Care Surrogate
4. Jewish Ethical Will

Yes, the thought of addressing these tasks is challenging and daunting, however for the well being of our families, it is essential to attend to this now.

It is essential to have all of these documents, completed, on file and shared with family members. It is far better for us to inform our family, our doctors and those we care about most, what WE want when we face serious illness.

It is painful beyond measure to be with a family

who is suffering the illness of a family member, trying to ascertain what they would want us to do for them, when they have not informed you in advance and are unable to inform us due to a serious medical situation. You ask me to help, you ask the doctor for guidance, and we are at a loss for what to do since we do not know what your loved one wants.

Help yourself and help your family. Attend to the tasks noted above. Fortunately, the Union for Reform Judaism through the Department of Family Concerns has published a **workbook entitled, “A Time to Prepare”** that guides us through the process of preparing these documents. I have copies in my office. Come get one, all I ask is that you contribute (if you are able) \$10 to cover the actual cost of the book to enable me to order additional copies.

A Jewish Ethical Will is an expression we leave to our family indicating our hopes and desires for them -a guide to follow, how to live their lives in concert with Jewish teaching and Jewish living. Our Jonathan Kahn Library has books that will guide you in preparing a Jewish ethical will.

I urge you make and keep this resolution. Please **come get your copy of “A Time to Prepare.”** Please take time to talk about these matters with your family. You will give yourself peace of mind knowing that you have attended to **the most important “gift”** you can give your family.

Rabbi Zukrow to **Announce “The Jew of the Year”**

On Shabbat eve, Friday January 22 at the 7:30 PM Shabbat worship, Rabbi Zukrow will announce his selection of the Jew of the Year for 2009. Since his arrival in Pensacola, Rabbi Zukrow has announced his selection each January. In previous years, Rabbi Zukrow has selected Prime Minister of Israel Ariel Sharon, Ruth Messenger, president of American Jewish World Service, Dr. Liviu Librescu, professor at Virginia Tech who died when he placed himself in front of his students during the attack by a student gunman and Jon Stewart, host of the Daily Show.

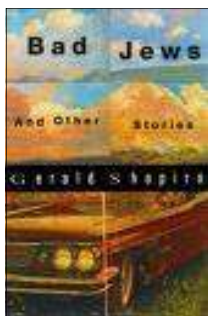

Bad Jews & Other
Stories
by Gerald Shapiro

This is a book full of very funny stories. I think it is wrongly titled or at least misleading. But I have to admit: the title piqued my interest so I bought it on Amazon. On the back cover, Publishers Weekly says the book is about **“lovable losers.”** One critic, Marly Swick, calls these **“stories of exiles.** Cut off from the character-building hardships their parents and grandparents endured, unable to reach the safety and comfort of faith because of their inability to believe much of anything, **Shapiro’s characters meander** through the moral landscape of their lives in a kind of loopy navigation **of the Children of Israel’s route home.”**

I don’t usually read short stories, but I loved being able to read a whole story, put the book down for awhile, then pick it up, and not have to remember the story line—must be my age! The first story gave me belly laughs in the middle of the night when I am usually **fast asleep. It’s about** a salesman who has a surprising fling with an

old high school classmate he runs into and then **tells the woman’s husband.** You will have to read this to find out what **he “sort of” tells the husband. I’m donating this book** so look for it among the paperbacks or call me to reserve it. Let me know if you enjoyed it as much as I did.

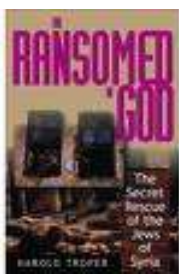
Ransomed of God
by Harold Troper

This is the amazing true **story of one woman’s** rescue of over 3,000 Syrian Jews over three decades. It tells us how Judy Feld Carr, a Toronto music teacher, did it. From **the book cover: “...she** secretly negotiated their escape—dealing with smugglers, bribing officials, haggling over travel documents, arranging medical aid, and funneling money to those in need, even to those in prison. The machinations involved diplomatic and intelligence officials at the highest levels—the Canadian, American, and Israeli governments, Jewish organizations, Amnesty International and the **International Red Cross.”**

While I have cheered when Israel won a war, I **haven’t given much**

thought about the Jews in Arab lands who might suffer repercussions. They did when the State of Israel was formed in 1948, and they did in subsequent wars. **“After 1948, Jews...in Arab** lands were in peril—none more so than the 5000 Jews of Syria. In the 1970s and 1980s their every move was closely monitored by the Muhaberet (the Syrian Security Police). Extortion, imprisonment, and torture were a constant **reality.”** **Read about all of this in Troper’s book. It’s** an incredible story. I will loan it out. Call me at 479-2140 to borrow it.

In February 2011, Rabbi Zukrow will participate in the biennial Consultation on Conscience, the premiere program of the Religious Action Center. Rabbi Zukrow received a grant to cover his participation in this program.
