From the Rabbi

In one of his routines, the comedian Jerry Seinfeld includes a series of jokes about check writing. He describes the dismay that overcomes him at the supermarket when, inevitably on an occasion he is pressed for time, the person in front of him at the cashier elects to pay with check. Seinfeld ruminates for a while about the choice of check and then concludes with his amazement at how proficient some people are at check writing.

I am certainly not one of those people. In the age of credit cards, automatic bill pay, and electronic banking, writing a check has become a very rare occurrence. With so little practice, filling out a check requires a lot more time and attention than sliding a credit card or clicking on the bank website. But this required level of mindfulness is not such a bad thing.

Originally by chance, and now by design, I make many of my charitable donations by check. Doing so gives me a few additional minutes to consider and appreciate the work the organization provides. I even try to write a few words of gratitude on the memo line: thank you for protecting the oceans, for advocating for Israel, for

strengthening our community, for giving kids a great summer.

In ancient times, of course, there was no choice between check and credit. Purchases were made with gold and silver coins or through barter. The same was true for donations and sacrifices - people brought animals and grains to the Temple as offerings. With so much going on, the Priests and Levites had to be experts in efficiency just to keep things running smoothly (think of parking at Disneyworld). This time of year — the period from Passover to Shavuot -- was a particularly busy time.

In addition to the daily offerings and prescribed sacrifices for the pilgrimage festivals, there was the special grain offering brought on the second day of Passover. The offering was known as the omer, with the name taken from the unit of measure -- roughly 3/4 of a bushel -- required to fulfill the mitzvah. Curiously, however, bringing an omer of grain to the Temple was just the beginning of a process. For forty-nine days the Israelites were commanded to literally count the days, a count which terminated with the festival of Shavuot. But why the counting? One explanation offered by the sages is that it provided time for

the Israelites to reflect on the meaning of the omer offering – a thank you of sorts for God's many blessings.

Though we no longer have the ancient Temple to which to bring offerings, we continue to mark this seven-week period with the counting of the omer. As we pause daily to perform this ritual, I invite you to take a few minutes to think about the contributions you make - with check, credit card, or most valuably, with your time. Reflecting on how and where we share our resources allows us to reaffirm our commitment to various causes and ideals. Additionally, it offers us the opportunity to ensure that we are supporting, with our donations and with our actions, the values we espouse and hold most dear.

May the days of the omer be a time of giving and growth, learning and love, caring and kedushah.

In April Dr. David Suhrbier will leave us to take a new position at Children's' Hospital in Chattanooga. His family will join him in June after school is out. He leaves behind memories of a wonderful physician, and a man dedicated to the wellbeing and care of our Temple children. He is the quiet hand who has prepared breakfast for our School For Jewish Living and participated in the governance of the Temple as a Board member for the past four years. His contributions were many and he will be sorely missed. For those who can't recall his face, you will always remember the wild colors of his tennis shoes. We also note that Jan Suhrbier has taught the pre-school age children in the School for Jewish Living. We wish them fair winds and following seas for the future.

As they planned for the Temple renovation, the committee steadfastly conducted a rolling set of priorities based upon our needs and their attendant costs. Educator's Message: Jewish Music and Jewish Identity



Effective music has transformative power in the way we think, feel, and connect with others. Music can emotionally transport us to another time, another place. It can make us laugh with joy or cry out in pain. Music as social commentary can unite us, divide us, and inspire us to action. Music unites generations. Music can help us connect us with God, a stranger, a friend.

Music has always been an integral part of Judaism. We are taught that the angels sang at creation, Miriam danced with her timbrel, the blasts of the shofar brought down the walls of Jericho, David's harp soothed King Saul. In our time it may be the haunting tune of Kol Nidre, the upbeat Hava Nagilah, the familiar melodious Hinei Mah Tov, or Debbie Friedman's Mi Sheberach that touches our soul.

Music can shape one's Jewish identity from the earliest of ages. A young mother recently asked me what she can do at home to help foster Judaism with her son. My response was to include Judaism is everything you do, at story time, play time, craft time, cooking, and music time.

These days we all potentially hold music in our fingertips, literally in our phones. The key is to find the appropriate Jewish music and to engage with it consistently.

Repetition is involved in learning a skill and forming one's connections. Just as a child sings along with Rafi hundreds of times, he/she can sing along with Rick Recht. Most young families listen to children's music in the car, why not have Jewish children's music be part of the rotation? Joyful modern songs about how being Jewish is cool, songs about colors, numbers as well as Shabbat and the holidays can shape the foundation of a child's Jewish identity. Older students can listen to prayers and modern songs from camp just as easily as any song on the radio. Adults can browse the thousands of contemporary and traditional Jewish songs on www.oysongs.com just as easily as on iTunes. The key is making Jewish music a part of your daily life. This month we will have several opportunities to experience some new Jewish music. On Friday April 10, fuse your love of jazz with Jewish music at the Jazz Shabbat service. On Sunday April 12, Rabbi Neal Katz will be visiting our students and teaching a workshop on Jewish song writing. On Friday May 1 and Sunday May 3, Camp song leader Nick May will once again fill our worship with spirited guitar music. May Jewish music be a part of your daily life, touching your heart and nourishing your soul.

Kitchen Kibbitz by Janet Schilling

As I write this column I am getting ready to travel to South Florida, or as it is known in my family, "Real Florida" to visit Logan's mom, his brother, my brother and assorted cousins who will be in the area. But I will travel back to Pensacola for seder to be with my extended family of friends, as Passover would not be the same without the family connection. Logan's family is not Jewish, so no chance for a seder with them, and my brother generally waits for an invitation from his extended family. So we find ourselves in an interesting situation. We will be in the most Jewishly populated area of Florida, but will return to "Lower Alabama" to enjoy a tradition that has been many years in the making.

While mulling all this over, I thought of one cousin who is traveling from North Jersey just so we can spend an evening together. We shared many seders at her mom's house, and enjoyed all the food specialties of the Passover season. What comes to mind is my grandmother in the kitchen preparing to serve her matzoh ball soup and she always leaned her head into the dining room and asked: "one matzoh ball or two and do you want farfel?" For some reason, farfel is not always readily available in this neck of the woods. But I have planned to bring some back from Boca, because I am pretty sure I can find it there. We never used it other than a garnish for Sophie's delicious soup, and that will always be the dearest memory, but I have plenty of cookbooks on my shelf and a quick search uncovered a mac and cheese alternative made with farfel and a basic farfel stuffing. I hope you have a chance to enjoy both, but if

farfel is hard to find, perhaps we need to ask the local merchants to add it to their Passover list for next year. I wish you all a very happy Passover.

Basic Farfel Stuffing from the Golda Meir Hadassah 50th Anniversary Cookbook 3/4 c. chopped onion

1 a disad salary

1 c. diced celery

1/4 c. oil

4 c. matzoh farfel

1/4 c. chopped fresh parsley

1 egg

1 c. chicken broth

1 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp white pepper

1 tsp. paprika

In a large skillet, sauté the onion and celery in oil over low heat until tender. Add farfel; stir until lightly browned. Add the parsley. In a small bowl, beat the egg with chicken broth, salt, pepper and paprika. Stir this into the farfel, continue to cook over low heat until the liquid is absorbed. Variation: Add mushrooms sautéed with onions and celery.

Cookbook

4 large eggs

3 c. matzoh farfel

1/2 lb. cheddar cheese

1 1/2 c. sour cream

6 tbsp. butter or pareve margarine 2 c. milk

C. IIIIK

1 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp pepper

Beat 3 of the eggs and pour over the farfel. Mix well. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees and grease a casserole. Pour the farfel mixture into the casserole. Cut the cheddar cheese into a small dice. Add the cheese to the farfel. Using a spoon, add the sour cream in dollops and dot with butter or margarine. Mix together the milk, remaining egg, salt and pepper and pour it over the casserole. Bake covered for 30 minutes. Uncover and let brown for 10-15 minutes more. Serves 8
