High Holy Day Group Honors

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are amongst the most important days in the Jewish year and a special opportunity to come together as a community. In so doing, we are also presented the chance to honor Temple leaders and volunteers. Many honors are given to individuals or families, but amongst the most special honors are those given to groups.

This year we have a number of group honors. If you fall into one of the categories being honored, please come up with the group. Your participation adds meaning and holiness to our worship.

On Rosh Hashanah the three aliyot -- blessings before and after Torah will serve as opportunities to honor:

- 1) Sisterhood Officers,
- 2) Active Duty Military,
- 3) anyone wishing to say Birkat Gomel, a special blessing of thanksgiving for those who have come through a difficult or dangerous time in the past year. Tradition-

ally this includes traveling abroad and child-birth, as well as surgery or a serious illness.

During Kol Nidre, past presidents of the congregation will be honored with the opening of the ark and the holding of the Torah scrolls.

On Yom Kippur morning, the three aliyot -- blessings before and after Torah will honor:

- 1) Temple Beth El members of 50 years or more
- 2) members who have joined Temple Beth El in the past two years,
- 3) the Temple Beth El education committee and teachers in the School for Jewish Living.

These three aliyot serve as a way of acknowledging the strong and rich foundation on which this congregation is built, its embrace of new energy and ideas, and its commitment to a bright and proud future.

From the President

I am looking forward to the arrival of the High Holy days and our worship service returning to our sanctuary. So on Erev Rosh Hashanah, which falls on Wednesday September 4th, we will gather at sunset to worship in our beautiful and historic Temple. It will be the beginning of a new year and everyone should be excited about this opportunity. It is a new beginning for each of us and as a Temple family.

Have you ever felt that you have a brief window of opportunity to take advantage of a situation? We stand on the cusp of a new era for our Temple family. The School of Jewish Living has come home to the Temple and we are now assured of a religious school that reflects a Reform Jewish experience. It is a window of opportunity that we seized, and which, in the future will assure us of a continuity of Reform Judaism here in Pensacola.

I was fortunate enough to have arrived in Pensacola more than a decade ago during a time of new beginnings. We now have a young and brilliantly talented Rabbi who has captured not only our hearts but reflects our strongest desires to move closer to the mainstream of Reform Judaism. His wife as our director of the School of Jewish Living represents our first professional educator and the educational program reflects that degree of

skilled excellence. We are growing in the number of young families and young members. There is a recognition and emphasis on welcoming interfaith families to our congregation. There are more adult education and Torah study programs than in recent memory. The Rabbi has established outreach programs in his Torah **On Tap** and **“Young, Jewish, Pensacola”** programs. Our Shabbat summer worship services continue to grow, due in part to the warmth of the service and the fellowship of breaking bread together. All of this has occurred in the past year. We have at each time when confronted with the opportunity seized the moment.

We are again at a time of new beginnings. The Temple needs not only your financial support but equally important your service. Now

is a time to consider what you want this Temple to be and how it should serve you. Volunteer commitments are needed in a variety of committees and task forces that address specific projects. Kitchen Kibbitz by Janet Schilling

In a month’s time we will have the new directory that Pat Braunstien and her team worked so hard on. I am sure you will agree, it is a beautiful and artistically arranged booklet. One of the benefits of getting your picture taken, at least the day Logan and I went, was a bag of chocolate bark on the registration table. Not being able to pass up chocolate in any form, I was grateful when Pat offered us a taste. It was a delicious and somewhat spicy dark chocolate confection. When pressed for the recipe, Pat told us that it was made by her friend, Michelle Lapidus, the mother of our cantorial

soloist for the High Holy Days!!! It is easy to make and was a big hit at our house. I am so happy that she decided to share this recipe and I am passing it on to you. It is simple and quick, just the right combination for a summer treat! Enjoy.

Mexican Dark Chocolate Bark
Raisins or nuts may be added as well or used to replace the ground coffee if desired.
12 ounces chocolate chips
Callebaut or Scharffenberger or 78% dark chocolate
1/4 tsp. chipotle chili powder
3/4 tsp. cinnamon
2 Tbsp finely ground coffee
Break the chocolate into pieces

if not using chips & microwave for 45 seconds on medium high (level 8). Stir gently with a rubber spatula
Return the bowl to the microwave for another 30 seconds on medium. Remove and stir. Repeat until melted
Combine the remaining ingredients with the chocolate and spread on a piece of parchment or waxed paper. Do not make the chocolate too thin. Chill the bark at room temperature and cut or break into pieces.

Servings: 24
Yield: 2 cups



Educator's Message: To Mississippi and Beyond

Earlier this summer my family and I shared an amazing Jewish experiences in the State of Mississippi. Prior to coming to Pensacola, this is not something I could have ever imagined. In mid June, we spent a week at URJ Henry S. Jacobs Camp in Utica followed by my participation in the multi-day education conference of the Institute for Southern Jewish Life (ISJL) held in Jackson. Both were inspiring, eye opening, and fun.

Being at Jacobs Camp with 12 children (including 3 on staff) from our Temple was incredible. Whether singing our hearts out, swimming in the pool, seeing them accomplish adventure obstacles, or just playing a game of tether ball, we participated with them in the magic that is Jewish summer camp. We formally gathered as a group one evening, but we informally connected at every meal and beyond throughout the week. Our bond with TBE youth was strengthened in new ways and we look forward to bringing even more camp spirit back to Temple. **And we can't wait to go back next summer!**

Representing our congregation at the ISJL Conference was also a recharging experience. There is nothing like being in a room with hundreds of colleagues, who share the same passion and drive for the Jewish education of their community.
