The Renovations Are Coming, The Renovations Are Coming!

Excitement about the Temple renovations continues to build. After a positive and engaging meeting with the congregation on June 29 during which many great ideas came forward, the architects have moved to the "design development" stage. Please visit the Temple's website (<http://www.templebethelofpensacola.org/>) to see the most recent version of the plans and renderings (revised as of July 23). Of particular interest, please note the addition of display cases in the Lower Lobby and Upper Lobby areas. The Lower Lobby cases have been reserved for items from the Pensacola Jewish Museum.

The actual construction work has begun. After a couple hard weeks of cleaning out the Pinn building (special thanks to Danny Zimmern, Janet Kahn and Kathy Smith for their dedicated efforts), the building has been demolished to make way for a construction staging area and grading for new parking. Work on modifications to the buildings is scheduled to begin immediately after High Holy Days, with completion target before Summer 2015.

The congregation has done a great job thus far in supporting the project. About 75 families having made pledges. We hope to achieve 100% participation from our congregational family. We are about 82% of our fundraising goal, but we need help reaching the goal line. In order to build the entire project, we need to raise another \$350,000 to \$400,000! Please join in supporting this momentous change to our Temple.

Many have made pledges to be paid over a period of up to five years, while others have offered to furnish their donations this year. We are most appreciative of all who have made pledges and very politely ask that those who intend to contribute some or all of their pledges this year please proceed with doing so.

From the Rabbi

We Are Going to Israel

As I write this article, warning sirens sound in Jerusalem and the Federal Aviation Administration's suspension of domestic carriers' flights into Tel Aviv remains in place. There are certainly more opportune times to announce a congregational trip to Israel – but no time is more significant. And so I proudly share that Temple Beth El will be taking a congregational trip to Israel, March 12-22, 2015.

Planning and committing to visit Israel is a show of our support and dedication to the Jewish state. In announcing our trip, we offer those whose lives have been disrupted by the threat of rockets and the glare of sirens, assurance that they are not alone. We declare that violence and hatred will not keep us from the sites, experiences, and friendships Israel has to offer.

We pray that the violence in Israel and Gaza will soon come to an end; that a true and lasting peace will take hold. But long after a cease-fire goes into affect, the economic impact of the fighting

will continue to be felt.

This summer's conflict is expected to cost the Israeli tourist industry several hundred million dollars. By traveling to Israel we participate in **"economic Zionism."** By visiting in the coming months, we will help those restaurants, hotels, and shops make up this shortfall – helping them stay open until what will hopefully be a more prosperous and peaceful 2015.

In this difficult time, Israel needs our support. But we also need Israel.

We need, as always, to experience the awe and holiness that comes from watching the sun rise over the Old City and worshipping at the Western Wall. We need the sense of amazement that comes from wandering the streets of Tel Aviv, full of boutiques and shaded by skyscrapers – a fulfillment of the Zionist dream. But also, after a summer filled with images of soldiers and bomb shelters, we need to see children playing in neighborhood parks and taxi drivers debating football. We need to be reminded that Israel is a three dimensional country – whose strength and resilience comes from a paradoxical mix of excep-

tionalism and ordinariness.

For these reasons and others, I am excited to be leading our congregation to Israel this March 12-22.

In planning the trip we are working with ARZA World Travel, part of the American Reform Zionist Association. A sample itinerary, preliminary pricing, and other information is available on the Temple website www.templebethelofpensacola.org.

From the President

After all the talking, meetings, planning and organizing, I am happy to report that we have taken the first step in our renovation project. The Pinn building has been demolished. Other grading work will immediately follow to protect the campus property. This should be a cause for celebration. As planned, our next step in renovating the Temple and school building, will start immediately following the High Holy Days. Hopefully the renovation will be completed by late spring or early summer. This is an exciting time, but one that will require patience and forbearance until the construction and landscaping has been completed.

We planned for a renovation that would create an accessible and welcoming Temple Beth El campus. Based upon our architectural and construction estimates, we are committed to a renovation that will cost \$2.2M+. At present we have commitments totaling \$1.7M+. There are a significant number of congregants who have not yet stepped forward with their commitments. Let me be clear that each of us must decide what we can donate. Every donation

counts whatever the size. But we need the commitments now. With this Temple Beth El Campus renovation, we are asking you to insure the future for Judaism here in Pensacola.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Deborah Buchalter for the many years of dedication to our Congregation and especially the last two years as a member of the Board of Directors and as Chair of the Outreach Committee. Her contributions were significant and deeply appreciated by the congregation and the Board of Directors. Well done and thank you Deborah! I would also like to welcome Zvi Salpeter as a new member of the Board of Directors. Con-

gratulations on your election and welcome. We would like to welcome back to Temple our cantorial soloist Gabi Lapidus who will be participating in some of our summer Shabbat services.

Our board meetings are open and you are invited to attend any and all of the meetings. We meet on the third Thursday of each month at 5:45 p.m. in the Max L. Bear Auditorium. Temple Beth El Cemetery Perpetual Care Fees

Temple Beth El does not have a “burial fee”. Instead, the bylaws adopt a system based on a Perpetual Care Fee. According to the bylaws, Article VIII Section 2e, the Perpetual Care Fund must produce sufficient earnings to cover all expenses associated with operating and maintaining the Temple Beth El cemetery. Based on the need to increase fees to cover the costs, the Board of Directors approved the following fees to become effective Jan. 1, 2015.

- Regular Members if purchased prior to death: \$3000
- Regular Members if purchased after death: Perpetual Care Fee plus 50% = \$4500
- Non-Members but eligible for Regular Membership: Perpetual Care Fee plus 150% = \$7500

Each subscription to the Perpetual Care Fund shall cover one gravesite. This does not affect previously purchased Perpetual Care, including those covering lots, rather than individual gravesites. **The Perpetual Care Fee may be paid “in full” or in installments over a period of time not exceeding five years provided the initial installment is not less than 20% of the total Perpetual Care Fee.**

Educator's Message: Bringing Camp to Temple

Having spent a week at Jacobs Camp this summer, I experienced the magic of Jewish camp with many of our Temple Beth El children. We celebrated Shabbat together, danced, swam, cheered, prayed and played. Connecting with our youth during this immersive and powerful Jewish time is a remarkable experience for a Jewish educator. Scholars have shown that the impact of Jewish overnight camp is one of the greatest indicators of continued Jewish engagement. The question is, given our Temple structure and setting, how can we bring the magic of camp into our synagogues?

Upon returning from camp, I participated in a webinar exploring this very topic. Dr. Jeff Kress, professor of Jewish education at the Jewish Theological Seminary posed two main questions: What is it about camp that makes it an impactful Jewish setting? What are some realistic ways we can make religious school more "campish?"

Dr Kress identified six areas of impactful settings: relationships, reflection and feedback, emotions, participant centered and empowered, systemic support, and integration of Jewish content. **If you've been to camp or have children who've been to camp, you know how each of these elements are part of the camp experience.** The challenge for Temple educators is how to integrate these elements in only 3 hours per week (as opposed to camp, which is 24/7 for two-six weeks per summer).

Jewish educators from around the country on the webinar offered suggestions and insights. This coming year I look forward to sharing these ideas, continuing the conversation and implementing new ideas into our school with the support of teachers, parents, and our Temple community.

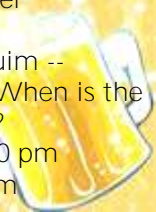

So I passed for 25 years and let the squirrels and birds enjoy the bounty. But Logan found a recipe online that he mentioned and I thought I would give them one more try. I am so glad I did. Caramelized figs are so easy to prepare that I have been trying to capture the last of the figs from my tree to caramelize and put on everything from yogurt, to cupcakes, to salad!

I have resolved to try new things and continue the journey through life knowing I have experienced the opportunities for growth that have come my way. I am looking forward to sharing my experiences and new recipes with you this year. Caramelized figs are just the beginning!

Caramelized Figs with Balsamic Vinegar

- 1/4 c. sugar
- 1/8 tsp salt
- Figs halved lengthwise through stem
- 1/8 c. balsamic vinegar
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 1/2 tsp lemon juice

In bowl stir salt and sugar together. Press cut side of fig into this mixture. Heat a sauté pan on high. Add the figs cut side down and cook 2-3 minutes. Turn figs to brown bottom. Remove pan from heat and add balsamic vinegar. Return to heat for 30 seconds. The vinegar will become syrupy. Remove from heat and add butter and lemon. Note: I have also tried cream sherry in place of the vinegar with wonderful results.
