From the Rabbi

During college, when I lived in the Boston area, the local sports radio station would do a live remote from Fenway Park every February. Bundled up in hats, gloves, and who knows how many layers, the radio personalities stood in the midst of the New England winter to announce to Boston sports fans the official start of spring -- the moment the Red Sox's equipment truck pulled out for Spring Training in Fort Meyers, Florida. While to an outsider the event appears to be both unnecessary and ridiculous, it served a valuable purpose. The station's annual remote reminded those living through months of grey skies that a sunny summer of baseball was not far off. With pitchers and catchers reporting the following week, it was time to start learning about the year's promising prospects, to circle on the calendar the dates when the hated Yankees were in town, and to begin emotionally preparing for the inevitably tragic roller coaster ride of a Red Sox season (at the time the Red Sox had not won a World Series in nearly 80

Like New Englanders turning their thoughts to baseball in February, it seems almost absurd to think about the High Holy Days in the midst of summer. But before we know it. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur will be upon us and there is much that needs to be done. Fortunately, the Jewish calendar has ways of announcing the approach of these important dates, of letting us know that it is time to begin preparing.

One way the holidays are announced is that throughout month of Elul, the month that precedes Rosh Hashanah, Psalm 27 is traditionally included in morning and evening services and, on weekdays, the shofar is blown. Both Psalm 27, which contains the phrase, "Hear, O Eternal, when I cry aloud; Have mercy on me, answer me," and the penetrating sound of the shofar remind us that it is time to look deep into ourselves, to begin asking God and those we have wronged for forgiveness, and in turn, to grant forgiveness to others.

Another important event on the calendar is the Selichot service. As we learn in Mahzor Vitry, an eleventh century work

describing observance of holidays, the Selichot service takes place late at night. The prayers, which focus on asking God for forgiveness, are sung to their High Holy Day melodies. In many ways Selichot is a "best of" mix of the High Holy Days and I find the service invaluable in helping set the right mindset going into Rosh Hashanah. Selichot falls this year on September 5th and I hope you will make a point of attending. The service begins at 9:00 pm and is preceded by a special movie and discussion starting at 7:00 pm.

With casual and carefree afternoons at the beach filling our thoughts, if not actually our days, it is hard to think about the traditions and demands of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. But taking time before they arrive to prepare ourselves, especially emotionally, can make a big difference in how we experience the High Holy Days. It may feel funny to prepare for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur during the dog days of summer, just like it seems ridiculous to get excited for baseball in February, but these early starts make all the difference.

Kitchen Kibbitz by Janet Schilling

The Schilling Bed and Breakfast has been operating at 100% capacity this summer. We were so happy to have a two week visit with Jordan and Candice, who recently returned from New Zealand. No sooner than they had left, Logan's brother passed through and shortly thereafter, my brother paid us a week-long visit. Great food and drink and did I mention desserts were on the agenda each day. And with all that catching up to do, the exercise program had to be put on hold! All that family love comes with a price which is verifiable and can be recorded on the bathroom scale! So now it is back to the business of healthy eating and shedding a few unwanted pounds.

One of my favorite breakfast recipes in the summer and is always on the B&B menu, is Ricotta Blueberry Pancakes. They are delicious and light (and by that I mean texturally, not calorically!) and a must when fresh blueberries are in season. And you might think that dieting has to be boring and flavorless, but not when you try some of the recipes from the "Zero Belly Diet" plan by David Zinczenko. All are wonderful and tasty and easy to prepare. As a matter of fact, I use many of them year round, not just when dieting becomes a necessity.

So I hope you enjoy the pancakes, but remember they can always be followed by a tasty salad or soup if the need arises.

Blueberry Ricotta Pancakes

1 1/2 c. flour

1 tsp. baking powder

1/4 tsp. baking soda

1/4 tsp. salt

1 1/2 Tbsp. sugar

4 Tbsp. melted butter

1/2 c. ricotta cheese

1 large egg

1/2 c. orange juice

1/3 c. milk

1/2 tsp. vanilla extract

3/4-1 c. blueberries

1 to 2 tsp. finely grated orange zest,

optional

Cooking oil spray

Note: This batter will be thick; not the pourable kind but it bakes up light and delicious.

In a bowl, combine the flour with baking powder, soda, salt, and sugar. In another bowl, whisk together the butter, ricotta cheese, egg, orange juice, milk, and vanilla. Combine the wet and dry ingredients just until blended. Gently stir in the blueberries and orange zest, if using. Spray a skillet or griddle with cooking spray over medium heat. Spoon a small amount of batter onto the hot skillet (I use an ice cream scoop) and spread gently with the back of a spoon. Turn when golden on one side. Continue cooking till golden on other side. Serve with blueberry preserves, blueberry or maple syrup. Serves 4

Going Lentil Soup

1 Tbsp. olive oil

1 medium onion, minced

2 cloves garlic, minced

1 Tbsp. fresh minced ginger

1/2 jalapeno, minced

2 medium carrots, peeled and diced

1 c. dried green lentils

1/4 tsp. cumin

1 bay leaf

8 oz. lite coconut milk

3 c. low sodium vegetable stock or water

1 Tbsp. reduced sodium soy sauce

1 Tbsp. red wine vinegar

Salt and pepper to taste

Heat olive oil in a medium pot on medium heat. Add onion, garlic, ginger, jalapeno, and carrots and sauté until the onions are soft and translucent, about 3 minutes. Add the lentils, cumin, bay leaf, coconut milkm and stock or water. Turn the heat to low and simmer until the liquid has reduced and the lentils are tender, about 30 minutes. Season with the soy sauce, vinegar, and salt and pepper to taste. If you like use a had blender to gently puree the soup for a thicker texture.

Makes 6 one cup servings
