Temple Beth El Cemetery Perpetual Care Fees

Temple Beth El does not have a "burial fee". Instead, the bylaws adopt a system based on a Perpetual Care Fee. According to the bylaws, Article VIII Section 2e, the Perpetual Care Fund must produce sufficient earnings to cover all expenses associated with operating and maintaining the Temple Beth El cemetery. Based on the need to increase fees to cover the costs, the Board of Directors approved the following fees to become effective Jan. 1, 2015.

Regular Members if purchased prior to death: \$3000
Regular Members if purchased after death: Perpetual Care Fee plus 50% = \$4500
Non-Members but eligible for Regular Membership: Perpetual Care Fee plus 150% = \$7500

Each subscription to the Perpetual Care Fund shall cover one gravesite. This does not affect previously purchased Perpetual Care, including those covering lots, rather than individual gravesites. The **Perpetual Care Fee may be paid "in full" or in installments over a period of time not exceeding five years provided the initial installment is not less than 20% of the total Perpetual Care Fee.**

From the Rabbi

Make Christmas a Holy Day

As a twelve year old I hated wearing the Santa hat. It was embarrassing and stupid, but my mom said I had to wear **it and there really wasn't** any use in arguing with her. So I put it on, picked up the pile of packages, and headed out into the cold chill of a December evening in northern Nevada.

The note on the top of the package said #7. Walking through the parking lot, I looked for the door with the corresponding number. When I located it, there was a middle-aged woman outside smoking a cigarette. I recognized her as one of veteran residents of the county owned motel affectionately called “**transitional housing.**”

Transitional housing was created to help people living on the streets get back on their feet. It provided them with an address, a roof, and little more. I had been there before many times with my mom and big sister. My sister, President of the **synagogue’s senior youth group**, had convinced the group to adopt the transitional housing unit as an ongoing project. They gathered clothing and other goods at the synagogue and other locations around town. Some local churches got involved and pretty soon it was a really big project, one which meant that once every week or so I was in the back of **my mom’s van passing for-**

ward bags of clothing that were distributed to the transitional housing residents in a **process my mom called “van shopping.”**

The woman who lived in #7 **wasn’t particularly friendly** and never said thank you for the things she received. As I approached, she, without really looking at me, told me to knock on the door. I did what she said and a few seconds later the door was opened by a young boy about four or five. He looked me up and down. Seeing my hat and the wrapped packages I was holding, there was no question in his mind that I **was one of Santa’s elves. He** ran up to me and gave me a big hug. We placed the presents under their sparsely needled tree and as I left he told me how happy he was to be getting presents this year for Christmas.

As I stepped outside of the small, one room apartment that Christmas Eve, the **Santa hat didn’t seem as stupid as it** did a few minutes earlier. It helped bring joy to the little boy who lived in apartment #7 and in turn helped bring a sense of holiness to my life.

I think of this experience every December and how **that year my “Christmas”** was both a holy and Jewish experience. I know many of you could tell similar stories. Christmas is not a Jewish holiday but it presents a wonderful opportunity for us to live the Jewish value of **G’milut Chasadim** – acts of

loving kindness. By volunteering on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, we perform acts of loving kindness by making the holidays more enjoyable for those we serve, and by freeing up those who normally wield the spatulas and ladles at our local soup kitchens and community organizations to spend their holiday with their families.

This year Temple Beth El is again partnering with the Pensacola Jewish Federation to provide Christmas morning brunch at the Ronald **McDonald House. Last year’s** event was a big success – with enough volunteers present to also help with household tasks. Under the continued guidance of Julie Rayborn and with your support I know this year will be great as well (See page 6 for details). Of course there are countless other opportunities to serve. I urge all of us in the Temple community who will not be sharing Christmas with family or friends, to find a way to volunteer. No matter where you help out, your time and energy will be appreciated. Plus, at some point the silly Santa hat atop your head will bring a laugh to someone you are helping. You will exchange smiles and in that moment the non-Jewish holiday of Christmas will become a Jewish holy day.

From the President

I am pleased to report that close to \$2.2 million has been generously pledged to the Temple renovation project, of which more than \$800,00 has been received.

During its November meeting, the Temple Beth El Board of Directors formally approved engaging Greenhut Construction to serve as general contractor.

While Greenhut Construction, along with Quina Grundhoeffer Architects, continue to value engineer the project, at present cost estimates exceed the available budget. As a result, a two-phased approach is being contemplated and improvements to the sanc-

tuary may need to be postponed until sufficient funds are secured.

Fundraising efforts are continuing in hopes that we will be able to raise the approximately \$300,000 in new contributions required to complete the entire project. The participation of our entire membership is required to reach our goal.

For those who are unaware, our Temple Administrator, Kathy Smith underwent knee surgery and is recovering at home. Meanwhile, she is conducting the Temple business from her home. I know you join me in wishing her a safe and speedy recovery.

Friends, at our Shabbat Service on Friday evening December 12, we will have a special blessing and Oneg in honor of Beverly Zimmern who will soon step down from the office of Mayor of Gulf Breeze. She has superbly served the people of Gulf Breeze, as well as represented Temple Beth El to the greater Pensacola area. Please make every effort to attend the service.

The theme this month is Hanukkah. And while you might expect me to give you a variety of latke recipes, I thought I would talk about the gifts of Hanukkah instead. Logan and I have forgone the tradition of exchanging gifts for quite a number of years. When I was a child, my brothers and I got one gift from our parents and one from our grandparents. But we looked forward to lighting the candles each night and trying to predict which might burn out first, or enjoying a simple game of dreidel. And there were always potato latkes. Plain, simple - potatoes and onions and fried in oil! Those are my simple memories of Hanukkah and it seems as an adult that has not changed too much. The gift that we do value above all else is the gift of friendship. And since we both live many miles from family, we are grateful for our very good friends in Pensacola; friends who have become our family in many ways. In February, two of those special friends shared one of their family birthday traditions **with us. They "kidnapped" us and drove** us to a mystery location where we shared a wonderful dinner. To return the favor, Logan and I thought of a variety of restaurants to visit with them, but the weather would not cooperate and we opted to go a different direction on our adventure. We surprised them with tickets to a show at PSC followed by dessert and champagne at our house. We are so lucky to have friends so dear they would share family traditions with us. We will look forward to the next adventure and

will continue to count our friends as our blessings. Wishing you a happy Hanukkah. What follows is the special cheesecake I made for that evening.

Pear Gingersnap Cheesecake from Food Network Kitchen

For the crust:

8 ounces gingersnaps (about 30 cookies)
4 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
1 tablespoon packed light brown sugar

For the pears:

2 tablespoons unsalted butter
2 firm Bosc pears, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch wedges
1 tablespoon granulated sugar
3 tablespoons molasses

For the filling:

2 8-ounce packages Neufchatel cheese, at room temperature
1 1/4 cups granulated sugar
3 large eggs
2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1 1/2 cups sour cream
Fill a roasting pan halfway with water and set on a rack in the lower third of the oven; position another rack in the middle and preheat to 325 degrees F. Wrap the outside (bottom and side) of a 9-inch springform pan with foil.
Make the crust: Pulse the gingersnaps in a food processor until finely ground. Add the melted butter and brown sugar and pulse to combine. Press into the bottom and about 1 inch up the side of the prepared pan; set aside.

Prepare the pears: Melt the butter in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add the pears, sprinkle with the granulated sugar and cook, stirring occasionally, until the pears are tender and lightly browned around the edges, 5 to 7 minutes. Add the molasses and continue cooking until syrupy, about 2 more minutes; set aside.

Make the filling: Beat the Neufchatel cheese and granulated sugar in a large bowl with a mixer on medium speed until smooth and creamy, about 2 minutes. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add the vanilla and flour and beat until just combined, then add the sour cream and beat until smooth, about 1 more minute.

Pour the filling into the prepared crust. Gently arrange the pear slices on top; set aside any extra molasses syrup at room temperature for serving. Transfer the cheesecake to the oven, placing it on the middle rack directly over the water bath. Bake until lightly browned and set around the edge but the center still jiggles slightly, about 1 hour 15 minutes. Transfer to a rack and let cool to room temperature, then cover and refrigerate until cold and set, at least 6 hours or overnight. Let the cheesecake sit at room temperature 20 minutes, then run a thin knife around the edge and remove the springform ring. Drizzle with any syrup remaining from pears.


