From the Rabbi

Israel: Continuing the Conversation

Whether we encountered Leon Uris' novel, Exodus, as a new release in 1958, found it buried on a bookcase decades later, or watched the movie of the same name, the heroic tale of Ari Ben Canaan likely played a role in shaping our understanding and relationship with the state of Israel.

The influence of Exodus, of course, transcended the Jewish community, helping to sway popular opinion in America from largely apathetic to actively interested in the wellbeing of the Jewish state.

In today's fragmented media world it is unlikely that any book or movie could have as significant and widespread an effect as Uris' novel. But Ari Shavit's new work, "My Promised Land" has drawn more attention and conversation than any Israel related book in years.

Shavit, a member of the editorial board at Haaretz, Israel's paper of record, tells the history of Israel from 1897 through the Knesset elections of 2013 elections by focusing on sixteen moments in the nation's past (and not the ones you would expect). The story Shavit recalls is that of a country and a region, but also personal, with his family and friends prominently featured.

Beautifully written, "My Promised Land" is likely, in equal measure, to challenge and affirm your feelings about Israel -- no matter what those feelings may be. As Leon Wieseltier noted in his New York Times review, "My Promised Land" startles in many ways, not least in its relative lack of interest in providing its readers with handy politics."

Winner of the National lewish Book Award and named one of 2013's must -reads by both The Economist and The New York Times, "My Promised Land" has quickly become an important part of the Israel discussion. A best seller since its November debut, it has been featured in opinion pieces by Thomas Friedman, David Brooks, and others. Equally important, it has been the topic of book discussion groups at synagogues and Jewish community centers across the country.

It is time for Temple Beth El to join the conversation. A special book discussion co-sponsored by the Brotherhood book group, will be held on Thursday, February 27 at 6:00 pm. I strongly encourage everyone to read the book in advance so you can fully participate. Print and digital copies are available online through Amazon, iTunes, and other vendors. There are also 3 loaner copies available in the Temple library.

If you are unable to read the book, still feel free to attend. I think you will gain by listening to the conversation. As people who care passionately about Israel, it is critical for us to stay engaged with the ongoing debate and discussion about the future of the Jewish State. Please join me in discussing Ari Shavit's "My Promised Land", the latest chapter in this most important conversation.

Last month's Sisterhood Shabbat talk by Sydney McAbee was so moving we wanted to share it.

The Meaning of Sisterhood

According to Webster's Eng-

lish Dictionary Sisterhood is a community of women bound by a common bond. It is an association, society, or community of women linked by a common interest, religion, or trade. At Temple Beth-el our bonds are many. Of course there is religion, but even more, we are bound by our quest to do what is expected of us in regard to Temple Life and Community Service. Along the way, we form bonds of friendship and common interest.

In November of 2013, Women of Reform Judaism celebrated their 100thAnniversary. In 1891, we began our involvement with Sisterhood as the Hebrew Ladies Benevolent Guild . In 1921, the guild joined the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, and so became the Temple Beth Sisterhood. Today we are still that same group with so much history and with many members of families of generations past.

We are not born of the same family, yet we are sisters in every sense of the word. Some of us did not play together as children, nor did we celebrate together the milestones of growing up, going off to school, marrying and raising families. We did **not attend one another's Bar** and Bat Mitzvahs, nor were we there to hold one an**other's hands when a child**

was critically ill or a parent dying. Some of us do not have memories beyond the time we moved to this corner of Paradise. Many of us at Temple Beth-el have shared these milestones and are so much closer because of it. Many of us have been in this corner of Paradise for as long as we can remember. When each of us chose to enter the doors of our synagogue, we BECAME one another's family. In a sense. we adopted---and were adopted by---one another. There is a common bond that unites us in spirit and in love, though we could never have known that this would happen.

Some of us are in our golden years, while others have not yet discovered the first

strands of silver in their hair... or perhaps have found them and decided to cover them up! Some of us are married, others divorced or widowed...or perhaps living alone or with a partner, by choice. Some of us have children and grandchildren, even greats...other do not. There is enormous variety in our educational backgrounds and our chosen professions. Among ourselves, we have a vast array of talents to share. And yet, different as we are, we feel that unmistakable pull towards one another.

Our Sisterhood was formed as a natural outgrowth of our

need and our desire to be together. As a viable group, we have embarked upon many projects, in the spirit of fun and sharing, while benefiting our Temple Community as well as the greater community in which we live. Naturally, not everyone is interested in the same things or to the same extent. But one thing is certain: we are unmistakably sisters---sisters by choice, by design, by destiny; sisters in our hearts.

And no one and nothing can ever weaken the bond of love and friendship that keep us fused together as

I am just back from Atlanta where Logan and I participated in the Hot Chocolate 15K and 5K race. And it is a good thing that it was a Hot Chocolate race, because the temperature at race time was in the low twenties!!! We really enjoyed that hot chocolate at the end of the race, clutching our cups with numb fingers.

One of our favorites restaurants in Atlanta is Souper Jenny. The story behind this restaurant is very interesting. The owner, Jenny, was an aspiring actress waiting tables in California who realized she liked food better than acting. She opened an adorable restaurant in Buckhead, serving amazing soup, sandwiches, salad, bread, and cookies. The menu changes every day, which is part of the fun. One of the soups on the menu the day we were there is her Chicken Tortilla Soup. It is cheesy and delicious! I hope the cold weather doesn't stay around too long, but if it does I am ready with recipes from a favorite restaurant.

Souper Jenny's Chicken Tortilla Soup Recipe Source: Souper Jenny Serves 4 Ingredients: 1/2 onion, chopped 2 carrots, peeled and chopped 2 stalks celery, chopped 1 14 oz can diced tomatoes 6 cups chicken broth 1 tablespoon chili powder 1/2 medium bag tortilla chips 2 chicken breasts, baked and shredded, or 1/2 rotisserie chicken, shredded 8 oz cheddar cheese, shredded 1 cup cilantro, chopped Directions:

Put the onion, carrots, celery, tomatoes, chicken broth, and chili powder in a large stock pot and boil. Lower heat and simmer for 45 minutes. Add the chips (crush first) and simmer for 20 more minutes, until they are blended in with the soup. Add the chicken and stir. Turn heat low and add the cheese, stir. Serve the soup in bowls and top with cilantro. Add hot sauce if you wish!
