### From the Rabbi

This March 17 Israelis will go to the polls to vote in a critically important election. With debate raging around a host of issues regarding both security and domestic policy, the election of the new Knesset, which will also determine who fills the office of Prime Minister, is likely to be a pivotal moment in the history of the Jewish state. While I trust many of us will follow the election with keen interest, only a very few in the congregation (those with Israeli citizenship) are eligible to vote.

That, however, is not the case for the other important Israel related election this winter, the World Zionist Congress (WZC) elections.

Taking place January 15 thru April 30, these elections will determine the delegates to the World Zionist Congress, also known as “the Parliament of the Jewish People.”

First organized by Theodore Herzl in 1897 in Basel, Switzerland, the WZC is now held every four years in Jerusalem. At this year's Congress, the World Zionist Organization will choose its leadership, determine policy, and designate its course of action going forward.

These decisions may seem distant or removed from

our daily lives, but for those of us who care about the future of Reform Judaism in Israel and around the world, they are of utmost importance. As Rabbi Joshua Weinberg, President of the Association of Reform Zionists of America (ARZA) explains,

The WZC, is the single most effective way for the Reform movement to influence policy and shape the society of Israel. The election determines the Reform movement's influence within Israel institutions, government bodies and provides the Reform movement with the ability to influence important policy appointments. In addition, the election impacts the amount of funding that the Reform movement receives in Israel and the Diaspora.

As Reform Jews, it is in our interest to ensure that America's WZC delegation, second in size only to that of Israel, reflects the reality of American Jewish life – one in which Reform Jews make up a majority. But in order to do so our votes are needed. Thankfully doing so is easy and open to all of us, 18 years of age or older.

Voting can be done online through the American Zionist Movement ([www.AZM.org](http://www.AZM.org)) or, for those who prefer, a paper ballot can be requested.

A \$10 charge, to cover the cost of the election, is collected as part of the voting process. To learn more about ARZA and voting visit: [www.ReformJews4Israel.org](http://www.ReformJews4Israel.org)

Electing a large ARZA/ Reform Movement delegation to the next World Zionist Congress (WZC) will strengthen Reform Judaism's call for the values and ideals we cherish – like equality, egalitarianism and peace – and will grant the Reform movement greater influence to shape what it means to be Jewish in the Jewish State.

Please take the time to vote and have your voice heard.

## Kitchen Kibbitz by Janet Schilling

This Hanukkah, as in seasons past, **Logan and I ordered a Greenberg's** smoked turkey for ourselves and to give as gifts for some of our family. Each year I think that I am ordering enough and each year Logan wins the discussion as I always up the poundage when I place my order. And this year as always, there are leftovers! I always try to find an interesting way to use up every last bit of turkey including cooking down the carcass in a pot of beans or black eyed peas for **New Year's Day. This year I didn't** wait too long to try a new soup recipe. I found it on the internet, but did plenty of tweaking of my own to use up some other ingredients I found in the refrigerator. So I will give credit to Betty Crocker for the inspiration and thanks to Chuck Lisner for the introduction to **Greenberg's, but otherwise this is an original!** Now that the weather has taken a turn (at least today it has) I think you will enjoy this smoky chowder **filled with potatoes. If you don't have** the luxury of a package of frozen smoked turkey leftovers from your **Greenberg's order, be sure to make** a note to order one early next November. **You won't be sorry.**



### Smoked Turkey Potato Chowder

#### Ingredients

1 - 2 Tbsp olive oil  
 1 c. sliced celery (2 medium stalks)  
 1 c. diced carrots  
 1/2 diced onion  
 3 c. diced potatoes  
 1 c. sliced fresh mushrooms  
 2 Tbsp all-purpose flour  
 1/8 tsp white pepper  
 2 c. low sodium fat-free chicken broth  
 8 oz. smoked turkey cut into cubes  
 white and/or dark meat (1 1/2 cups)  
 1 cup frozen sweet peas  
 2 cups low fat milk  
 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley

#### Directions

Add oil to 3-quart saucepan on medium heat. Add celery, carrots, onion, mushrooms and potatoes; cook about 5 minutes, stirring frequently, until onions are translucent. Stir in flour and pepper until well blended. Increase heat to medium-high; gradually stir in broth, cooking and stirring until bubbly and thickened. Stir in turkey breast, peas, milk and parsley. Heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer 8 to 10 minutes, stirring occasionally, until potatoes are tender. Makes about 6 servings.



### BONUS RECIPE!

Spinach Quiche from the Christmas morning brunch at Ronald McDonald House

#### Ingredients

**2 cans (8 oz each) Pillsbury™ refrigerated** garlic butter crescent dinner rolls (8 rolls each)  
 1 package (8 oz) cream cheese, softened  
 3 Eggs  
 1 small onion, chopped (1/4 cup)  
 1 box (9 oz) frozen chopped spinach, thawed, squeezed to drain  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/8 teaspoon pepper  
 1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

#### Directions

Heat oven to 350°F. Spray 16 (2 3/4x1 1/4-inch) muffin cups with cooking spray. Separate each can of crescent dough into 8 triangles. Press 1 triangle on bottom and up side of each muffin cup. In large bowl, beat cream cheese with electric mixer on medium speed until smooth. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in onion, spinach, salt and pepper until well mixed. Fold in cheese. Fill each cup to the top with egg mixture (do not overfill). Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean and edges of rolls are golden brown. Remove from pan. Serve warm.
