From the Rabbi

Widening the Door to
Our Big Tent

Attending the Union for **Reform Judaism's Biennial** in December was a reminder of the inspiring diversity found within the North American Reform Jewish community.

Among the 5,000 people in attendance, there were those raised in the Reform movement (the Biennial celebrated 75 years of NFTY), and those who came to Reform Judaism as adults from other branches of Judaism or as Jews by choice. There were representatives from large urban and suburban congregations, and those from rural communities of only a few dozen individuals. (I think I met half the congregation from the Upper Peninsula of Michigan -- the 70 degrees weather of a San Diego December having something to do with their surprisingly large contingent). There were attendees who preferred morning worship led from the old Union Prayer Book and those who woke up early to participate in services that incorporated yoga and meditation. And at night, as we made our way to concerts held throughout the Gaslamp District, there were those drawn to performances of classical hazanut (cantorial singing) and those who sought out performances

by the latest stars on the Jewish Rock scene.

The 2013 URJ Biennial was a testament to the diversity of Reform Jewish life. Our movement is truly a big tent. But a presentation at the Friday morning plenary served as a reminder that there are many, who despite their profound desire to be included, remain outside that tent.

The presentation, featuring a discussion with Jacob Ruderman of the Ruderman Foundation, focused on those in our community with physical challenges. As the presentation highlighted, far too many of our congregations, either because of the culture of our institutions or because of the physical layout of our facilities, remain places where those with disabilities do not feel included.

At Temple Beth El we pride ourselves on the warmth of our welcome, but when we consider the current state of our physical plant – the absence of an elevator and no handicapped access to the bimah -- it is clear that the welcome we extend to those with disabilities or physical limitations is a qualified one.

As we look toward the future of our congregation — both in terms of welcoming new members but also serving the needs of our

existing members -- these are issues that must be addressed. So too we are challenged, individually and collectively, to create a culture that welcomes and supports those living with disabilities. As URJ President Rabbi Rick Jacobs shared in his keynote sermon, "You can subcontract out the construction of a ramp, but being fully accessible and open to people with disabilities is work that we can only do ourselves, person-by person, moment by moment."

An estimated 20% of the American Jewish population is living with some form of disability and as we age all of us will face one form or another of physical limitation. Temple Beth El should be a place of learning and celebration for Jews of all physical abilities. Temple Beth El can be a place of learning and celebration for Jews of all physical abilities.

As we begin the secular year 2014, may we resolve to achieve this goal. Together we can ensure that the door of our synagogue is truly wide enough to welcome all who seek community, learning, and holiness.

From the President

The new calendar year 2014 has arrived with changing weather that reflects a hint of great things to come for our Congregation. It is an announcement of new beginnings. Our past year has been filled with significant events and experiences that have enriched our lives. Yet, we cannot dwell upon the past but must look forward to our future.

One of the key elements I want to focus on for the future is the issue of transparency. Like the other issues of our time, we have a hard time defining it. For me, it means that our Temple business is conducted in a transparent manner, and by that I mean we create an open environment which serves to keep our membership fully informed with open channels of communication to the Temple leadership.

Our efforts are intended to provide the maximum information on the Temple campus, religious and educational events, calendar and special celebrations that are of interest to the congregation. On a weekly basis, the Rabbi provides an email with the weekly events of interest. The Director of the School for Jewish Living, Andrea Fleekop, authors a weekly email of significant activities in the school. The monthly Bulletin contains all of the information related to Temple services, activities and other information about the Temple. Rich Cacace is the Webmaster

for the Temple Beth El website and it reflects all of the information from other sources including the Temple calendar and is updated as changes to the schedule occur.

I have been asked about the Board of Directors meetings. We meet the third Thursday of every month at 5:45 pm in the Temple social hall. Any member of the congregation can and is encouraged to attend. One of the hallmarks of our Temple governance is that all votes are open. The minutes of our Board meetings are available through the Board Secretary, Pat Braunstien, on request. In May of each year we have an annual meeting of the members of the Congregation, and every member is encouraged to attend. I have harped on the issue of your participation in committees because much of the work of the Temple is accomplished through their efforts.

This year the by-laws committee, with the assistance of other committees, is undertaking a review and update of the Temple by-laws. Their efforts will be discussed and approved by the Board of Directors and then sent as a recommendation to the Congregation for your approval. The Long Range Planning Task Force, which has been at work since July, is framing a new long range plan which they will shortly be presenting to the Board of Directors for their approval and recommendation to the Congregation for their approval. This effort reflects the surveys, discussion groups, past Shabbatons and individual meetings, where you have expressed your desire for change and focus. We are still working on a plan for the modernization of the Temple campus. The Committee will be submitting their initiative to the Board of Directors for their input and approval and then at a special Congregational meeting, I will be asking for your approval for implementation.

In early 2014, a new telecommunications system will be installed at TBE. Our current system has failed and we are down to one functioning line. The system is old and uses outdated technology that can no longer be maintained. The new system will have a backbone called a T-1 which will give us all the services we need both now and in the future. The new phone and data system will be installed and maintained by Callis Communications, a local company that offers 24/7 customer service based in the USA.

I wanted you to know that Rabbi Fleekop has been a welcomed integral part of all of these initiatives. Creating a loving and open congregation is not just a single effort but requires the attention of all our members every day. Key to our success is the recognition that talking is not a one way street. We need your ideas and your participation.

Julie Rayborn's Breakfast Casserole

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

1 Fresh French Bread loaf, cubed

6 Eggs, beaten with 1 cup milk

1– 1 1/2c. Shredded Cheese

1-2 c. total diced mushrooms, green & red peppers & onions Either olive oil or butter

Salt & Pepper to taste

Saute' veggies in pan — either with olive oil or butter and add salt and pepper for flavor. Cook the veggies down until soft. Beat eggs, milk & add salt & pepper for taste. Coat bottom of casserole dish with butter or oil. Layer cubed bread in the casserole dish. Place veggies on top. Place shredded cheese next — if you have the time — use

block cheese and shred it so it's nice & fresh. Pour beaten eggs over casserole dish to cover the cheese. Place in oven and cook until eggs are nice and fluffy and cooked – should be around 20 minutes. If you like a little kick add Tabasco sauce right before you are ready to serve. Fniov!

2013 Bienniel Informal Report by Pat Braunstien

Five thousand Jewish people in a convention center produce an energy level beyond measure. We were on the go from morning into the night when we had the stamina. A two hour time difference was tough when programs were scheduled for 9 PM PST or later & our 11 PM CST bodies wanted to go to bed.

Nonetheless, we learned a lot attending breakout sessions. Many were geared to small congregations, so their content was particularly useful. Though we were all "small" there are marked degrees of size. Our 150+ member congregation seemed HUGE in comparison to those with only 20 to 35 families. URJ has organized a group to focus on assisting small congregations. We have invited one of their representatives to visit Pensacola to share success stories from other congregations. Soon there will also be an online chat room available on which we can exchange ideas.

I focused my attention on ways to improve communications. Fortunately, many of them are low or no cost and that fits our budget very well. We will use additional forms of social media to connect with our existing links such as our website, weekly e-mail, Facebook page and monthly newsletter.

BTW - The shopping area was awesome! I have never seen so many unique tallit, kippot, wall hangings, shofars, Temple aids and Judaica in one place! I am happy to report that my credit card worked well there.

Rabbi Jacobs, President of the URJ, announced that his team relocated a group focusing on youth engagement over to the Hebrew Union College Campus and that they then sold the second floor of their building to raise funds. That money will be used on programs to engage and retain young people. What a wise decision! We were proud to learn that Reform is the only growing branch of Judaism.

Saturday morning Shabbat services were scheduled for 2.5 hours following a musical wake-up. We sang our way downstairs into the huge auditorium where the service was to be held. I feared that I would be bored with too much heavy religion. Instead – the time flew because of interesting speakers, music, presentations, dancing while seated in chairs

(we'll teach it to you!) and a mind blowing Torah reading. thirteen platforms and tables were set up throughout the auditorium. Local congregations carried a

Torah to each one. We heard the story of Jacob blessing his twelve sons and naming a tribe after each of them. Then a woman came forward and introduced herself as Jacob's daughter Dinah. She was pitied because she did not get a tribe. Instead she replied that her gift was far better than that of her brothers.... that she was gifted with woman's intuition and the ability to multi-task. That nearly brought down the house since the Women of Reform Judaism were out in full force celebrating their 100th anniversary. Then simultaneous Torah readings began with different groups of witnesses surrounding each passage. First were the current NFTY members who were joined by all past NFTY members. This huge group represented nearly half the audience. They were followed by the rabbis: 1/3of the audience, the WRJ - nearly half the room again and so on. Nearly everyone in the room took a turn at a Torah platform. It was a fabulous experience!

The next Biennial is in 2015 in Orlando. Perhaps we can carpool there to fan our growing congregation's enthusiasm.
