Birthdays & Jewish Holidays: Things We Forget Over the Summer

When I was in elementary school there was a delicious custom of students bringing in cupcakes for the class on their birthday. It was a wonderful treat that not only provided us with a rush of sugar but also consumed five minutes of the afternoon, time that might have been spent on decidedly less enjoyable activities like multiplication tables or practicing our handwriting.

There was only one problem with the custom. While roughly three fourths of the class had an annual opportunity to showcase their mother's baking and have the class sing happy birthday to them, the one fourth of the class born in the summer was denied this opportunity. Unfortunately I, along with my twin-brother and older sister, were part of this unlucky bunch.

I'll never know whether she was motivated by love or a desire to prove her own baking ability (I chose to believe it was love) but my mother set out to right this horrible injustice of the elementary school world. And so each spring, during the last week of class, my mom would bring cupcakes to school. As she explained to my classmates, they weren't just in honor of my birthday but everyone in the class who was born during the summer. While I had to share the singing of happy birthday with some of my classmates, it felt nice to be acknowledged.

I imagine the Jewish holidays that fall during the summer must feel like the kids with summer birthdays did before my mom came along. With school out of session and fami-

lies on vacation, far too many of these special, important, and holy days go by simply unnoticed.

While giving out cupcakes to raise awareness would be inappropriate, especially since some of them are fast days, these holidays need not remain forgotten.

The 17th of Tamuz, which this year begins the evening of June 24th, is the date on which the Roman legions began their siege of Jerusalem in the year 70 C.E. The 9th of Av, which starts at sunset on July 15th, marks the date on which the Second Temple was plundered and destroyed, an event famously depicted in the Arch of Titus. In addition to the Roman destruction in 70 C.E., Jewish tradition teaches that the First Temple was also destroyed on this date in the year 586 B.C.E. Both the 17th of Tamuz and the 9th of Av are observed as fast days, though some modify this observance in light of the establishment of the State of Israel. Additionally, it is customary to read the Book of Lamentations, usually by candlelight, on the 9th of Av.

The 15th of Av, or Tu B'Av provides us with an opportunity to celebrate. This ancient holiday is described in the Talmud as one of the most joyous days of the year. According to tradition, during the days of the Temple it was the custom for unmarried women to dress in white, thus eliminating any distinctions between rich and poor, and go out into the fields and vineyards around Jerusalem where they would sing and dance. Men, from all the various tribes would assemble and, despite the custom of marrying only within one's tribe, would seek out wives from amongst all the unmarried women of

Israel. After the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 C.E. the holiday of Tu B'Av was all but forgotten. With the establishment of the State of Israel, however, it has been revitalized. Also known as Hag Ha-Ahava – the festival of love, it is the Israeli Valentines Day. This year Tu B'Av begins at sunset on the July 21st, providing each of us with a wonderful reason to celebrate the people we love.

Finally, there is Rosh Hodesh Elul, or the beginning of the month of Elul, which begins at sunset on August 5th. While the first of each Hebrew month is marked as a "mini-holiday," the start of Elul is especially significant. Preceding Rosh Hashanah by exactly one month, Rosh Hodesh Elul is the official start of the High Holy Day season. Throughout the month special prayers are included in worship. Additionally, it is customary to use the month of Elul to reflect on the year past and to begin the work of t'shuvah, the process of making amends that is at the heart of the High Holy Days.

The summer holidays are a significant part of the Jewish year. They recall defining historical events, times of joy and sadness, the celebration of love, and the importance of reflection. As spring comes to a close, I hope we will find a way, as my mom did with her cupcakes, to make sure that the important dates of summer don't go unnoticed.

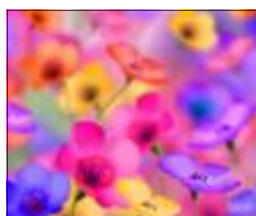

Kitchen Kibbitz

The cool breezes of a Pensacola spring did not last long and the heat of an early summer is upon us. With that comes the afternoon rain, and that combination is perfect for an abundance of what is growing in the garden.



One of the easiest things to grow are herbs. No green thumb needed—they thrive in sandy soil with minimum attention. When you hit that bumper crop of basil you might consider a new twist on an old favorite. Added to garbanzo beans and garlic, it makes a beautiful hummus in no time at all. I hope you enjoy this unusual combination that yields delicious results.

Edamame Basil Hummus

Ingredients

2 c. shelled, cooked edamame (you can use frozen)
2/3 c. chickpeas (garbanzo beans), drained and rinsed
3 cloves garlic
1/2 c. fresh basil
1/4 c. lemon juice
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. freshly cracked pepper
1/3 c. extra virgin olive oil
Chips, crackers or vegetables for serving

Reserve one tablespoon each of the edamame & garbanzo beans for garnish. In a food processor, blend the remaining edamame & the remaining garbanzo beans with garlic, basil, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Slowly pour the olive oil through the feed tube while the processor is on. Process until smooth & well blended. Add salt and pepper to taste.

Pour into a serving bowl & garnish with edamame, garbanzo beans, olive oil and basil. Serve with chips, crackers or veggies.
