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A Vision for Our Future

Please join us for a very important meeting of the entire congregation on Sunday, March 2, 2014 at 1:00 pm at which a vision for improvements to the Temple Beth El campus will be shared.

Wholeheartedly endorsed by the Board, the proposed renovations have the potential to foster a new era of enjoyment of Reform Judaism in Pensacola and to maintain the enthusiasm and vibrancy that Rabbi Joel Fleekop has rekindled.

Please know that foremost among the vision is the preservation of the beauty and historic character of the sanctuary, including the stained glass windows. Some of the improvements that are contemplated include:

- A new, improved and more efficient kitchen
- Greatly enhanced accessibility for those with physical limitations (including an elevator!)
- More convenient vehicular ease of access
- Enlarged Max L. Bear Auditorium
- Enriched aesthetics about the entire campus
- A new, grand entry and a welcoming lobby/majestic entrance to the sanctuary
- An adult education learning center
- A more efficient design that will enhance use of the facilities

This project may prove to be the most industrious effort that our congregation has undertaken since the construction of our Temple building in 1931. A committee has been hard at work implementing the objectives and securing funding. There has been **great success thus far, but to succeed, everyone's support is needed.**

A brochure including preliminary conceptual plans was being mailed to members. On March 2 you can learn more details about this exciting project, ask questions, and learn how you can support the effort.

From the Rabbi

The Custom of Costumes

“Make the fourteenth day of the month Adar a day of gladness and feasting, and a holiday, and of sending portions one to another.”

These words, from the Book of Esther, 9:19, establish Purim as a time of joy and happiness and give rise to the tradition of sending gifts of food to friends, known as mish-loach manot, or in Yiddish, shlach manos. The sending of portions is mentioned again just a few sentences later, in verse 22, where it is accompanied with the call to send gifts to the poor – from which the mitzvah of matanot **l’evyonim is derived.**

In addition to the two gift-sending mitzvot mentioned by the Book of Esther, the rabbis prescribe hearing the megillah read aloud and a festive meal -- at which wine is customarily the beverage of choice.

While these ancient mitzvot continue to shape our observance of Purim, an important part of the modern celebration goes unmentioned. Nowhere in the Book of Esther or early rabbinic writings is there any mention of costumes.

It wasn’t until the medieval period that costumes became part of Purim – and

only in the last 150 years that Sephardic Jews have included the custom in their Purim celebration. The first mention in rabbinic literature appears in a response from the late 15th century. There the Mahari Mintz responds to a question of whether it is permissible for a man to wear **women’s clothing and women to wear men’s** clothing as part of their Purim costumes, ruling that on Purim cross-dressing is permitted.

The inclusion of costumes into our observance of Purim can be explained in two simple ways. First, many of the early spring festivals observed by the medieval **Jews’ gentile neighbors** included costumes. Second, it is just fun to dress up. But as they did with the dreidel, a relatively new addition to Hanukkah, the rabbis sought to imbue the wearing of costumes on Purim with religious meaning.

One popular explanation for disguising ourselves on Purim is that God, who is not mentioned in the Book of Esther, is disguised by the narrative. According to the rabbis, God is hidden by what seem to be natural occurrences but are in fact truly miracles. This is supported by the fact that the name Esther means hidden, appearing in the Torah as **part of the phrase “I will**

hide my face” (Deut. 31:18).

Others explain that costumes remind us of the role hidden and mistaken identity plays in the Purim story. Many of the occurrences of misidentification in the Book of Esther and accompanying midrash are for comedic purpose. For example, in one Talmudic tale **Haman’s daughter mistakes** her father for Mordechai and drops a chamber pot on his head. And so it is appropriate that our costumes be worn in a silly and lighthearted fashion.

And finally, it has been suggested by modern scholars that we joyously don costumes on Purim because we are fortunate to live in a time when disguising our true identity is a lighthearted luxury rather than, as it was for Esther and many of our ancestors, a solemn necessity.

The wearing of Purim costumes is a new custom (at least by Jewish standards), but one that, like the **holiday’s more ancient tradi-** tions, is rich with meaning. As we put on our costumes this year, let us spend a few moments thinking about the diverse symbolism associated with this silly tradition. For even in plastic firemen hats, purple princess gowns, and super-hero capes, Judaism has a way of instilling history, hope, and holiness.

From the President

On Thursday February 20, 2014, the Board of Directors approved the proposed renovation project to significantly upgrade the Temple Beth El campus. Our object in the renovation is to make the Temple campus more accessible and create a warm and welcoming environment for the Congregation. You also have received both an email and letter from the Board and the renovation committee outlining some of the more salient features of the renovation. The email and letter address the creation of a capital campaign to support funding the project. We have scheduled an informational congregational meeting during which the concept and renovation plan will be presented, and you will have an opportunity to ask questions and make both comments and recommendations. The meeting will be held on March 2nd at 1:00 pm in the Max L. Bear Auditorium. This renovation is the most significant we have undertaken since the Temple was built on its present location in 1931. I encourage everyone to attend the informational meeting and to participate **in the discussions. It's the chance of a lifetime to participate in setting the path for our future Temple development. I look forward to seeing you there.**

If you have wondered

about being asked to join a Temple task force instead of committee, let me explain. A committee usually has standing under the Temple bylaws and membership is for the term of the current Temple board. I chose to use task forces, since they consist of a group of members who agree to undertake a specific project within guidelines that are agreed upon before the project begins. It is conducted within a given timeframe and has a specific termination date. Simply put-it has a start and completion date and members can depend upon those timeframes. A good example was the telecommunications/telephone task force, which researched, negotiated and presented the Board with a modern system that will serve us well into the future and at a reasonable price. Sid Braunstien and his committee of 8 were able to deliver a proposal within the 60 days allotted to the project. Our new phone system is functioning very well indeed!

I recently met with Sam Bearman, President of **B'nai Israel Congregation.** In the meeting we agreed to discuss potential activities in which both congregations could participate. Some of the suggestions we discussed included: arranging a joint meeting between both Boards; inviting all Temple veterans

to participate in the **Veterans Day Dinner at B'nai Israel;** there will be an attempt to re-start the Association of Jewish War Veterans Chapter here in Pensacola; investigating possible **joint Brotherhood/Men's Club** activities; and attending **the last day of the B'nai Israel's 613 Project** to complete the writing of a new Torah. We also agreed to investigate other activities together and in concert with the Federation that would serve to stimulate closer relations between the two congregations. We agreed to meet periodically to continue our discussions.

My wife and I wanted to express our deep appreciation for your best wishes for a speedy recovery following my recent illness.

Kitchen Kibbitz by Janet Schilling

Apple and Pear Tart with Walnuts
John Besh / Cooking from the Heart

Dough

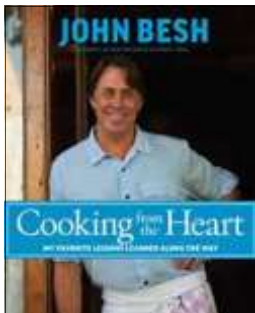
1/2 c. cold butter, cut into pieces
2 1/4 c. flour, plus more for rolling
1/3 c. sugar
1/4 c. milk
1 egg
1 tsp. grated lemon zest
1 tsp. salt.

In a large bowl, cut the cold butter into the flour until the flour has the consistency of semolina. Add the sugar, milk, egg, zest and salt and mix by hand until a crumbly dough is formed. Shape the dough into a ball, wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least an hour before using.

Filling

3 tart apples, peeled, cored and cubed
2 Bosc pears, cored and cubed (skin on)
1/2 c. dark brown sugar
1/2 c. butter cut in pieces
1/2 c. walnuts, toasted and roughly chopped
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1 Tbsp. lemon juice

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. On a well-floured surface, roll the tart dough into a large oval a little less than 1/4 inch thick. Transfer to baking sheet. In a large bowl, toss the apples and pears with the brown sugar. Add the butter and toss again. Add the walnuts, cinnamon, and lemon juice and toss well. Mound the fruit and walnut mixture on top of the dough and wrap the dough over the fruit, covering most of it. Bake until the crust is golden brown, about 1 hour. Remove and cool a bit before serving. Serves 8-10
