From the Rabbi

How are you doing?

A few years back a commercial aired during the Super Bowl in which a man walks into a bar and when asked how he is doing proceeds, to the bartender's dismay, to give a long explanation about how he just got into town and is excited to see his sister. As soon as he is done speaking, someone else sits down next to him and asks, "How are you doing." The question is met with the same detailed response. This sequence is repeated several times, with the others in the bar groaning each time a newcomer asks, in one form or another, "How are you doing?"

The commercial makes a joke at the expense of the man for failing to recognize that in much of America "How are you doing?" is not a real question, but rather a customary greeting. A proper response might be "Good, how about you?" or "Alright, how are you doing?" The content of one's response doesn't really matter. What matters, is that the response is brief.

The evolution, however, of a question about another's well being into a greeting one offers casually and in passing has come at a cost. What words should we use when we truly want to know how someone is doing? When we wish to share with others how we are feeling or reach out for help, how can we be confident that we aren't "over-sharing" or "unloading" on someone

who isn't really that interested?

This month Jews around the world celebrate the holiday of Shavuot. As part of our observance we read from the Book of Ruth. The story highlights the selflessness and loyalty of Ruth and Boaz. But in addition to their examples, we can also learn from the model set by Ruth's mother-in-law, Naomi.

As described in the first chapter, Naomi's life has been difficult. Driven from her hometown of Bethlehem by famine, Naomi's husband and two sons died while living abroad in Moab. As the chapter comes to a close, Naomi returns to the land of her birth where the women of the town meet her.

Though scholars disagree as to whether the townswomen's question "Is this Naomi?" is a joyous one in seeing her return or one of disbelief in seeing this once proud and noble woman so humbled, what is clear is that Naomi finds it necessary to share with the women how she feels, to give this ancient version of the question, "How are you doing?" an honest answer. She replies,

Do not call me Naomi – pleasantness. Call me Mara – bitterness, for Shaddai has made my lot very bitter. I went away full, and the Eternal has brought me back empty. How can you call me Naomi, when the Eternal has dealt harshly with me, when Shaddai has brought misfortune upon me! Naomi's words are a powerful and raw expression of emotion. Though not entirely accurate, she has a daughter-in-law who will play an important role in her rehabilitation, they provide an opening for others to reach out to her in assistance.

This is not the only time Naomi shares with others how she is feeling. As the Book of Ruth draws to a close, the women of Bethlehem again speak to Naomi, offering words of blessing following the birth of Ruth and Boaz's son. As she responded earlier to the women, Naomi answers their words with a show of emotion. She publicly embraces the child, an expression of her joy and an invitation for others to share in her happiness.

As a synagogue community it is critically important that individuals, like Naomi, feel comfortable sharing and expressing their emotions, both in times of joy and happiness, as well as distress and sadness. As a holy community, it is critically important that we, its members, be open to listening and to creating opportunities for sharing.

Thankfully opportunities for sharing and listening already exist in everything we do, as in everything we do our community members have the opportunity to interact with one another. All that is missing is for us to truly ask and honestly answer the question, "How are you doing?"
