From the Rabbi

Thoughts Behind an Investment

I begin at Azalea Trace where a group of about 15 has gathered in Bettie Kahn's beautiful apartment. Over the past year and a half I have had the pleasure of getting to know this group, mostly by seeing them at the monthly Shabbat services held in the retirement community's chapel, but also through the reverent stories shared by fellow congregants. They are pillars of the community: former congregational and sisterhood presidents, board members, and religious school teachers. Most of them were once weekly fixtures at Shabbat worship.

I, along with a few of the congregation's current leaders, joined them to share preliminary plans for the Temple renovations. The plans, especially the elevator and renovated kitchen, are received with great enthusiasm. When the time comes for questions there are a series of queries about timeline. Timeline questions were asked at other meetings I attended but it is clear that these elders of our community are asking something different. They aren't asking how construction will impact Friday night worship or plans for next year's Passover Seder. They are focused on how quickly these improvements, especially those pertaining to accessibility, can be made. They are asking how guickly they can "come home" to their beloved Temple and sanctuary.

Helping these members, who have meant so much to our

community over the years, "come home" is one of the reasons my family is participating in the capital campaign.

I continue in the windowless conference room of a local hotel. I am there as part of the Chamber of Commerce's Leadership Pensacola program. During a break, a classmate, who works for one of the area's largest employers, shares that his company was trying to bring someone to town to fill an opening. While the candidate was going through peer interviews his wife was toured around town and since they were Jewish she asked to go by the Temple. She pulled into the parking lot, looked around, and decided not to get out. The candidate later withdrew from consideration. My classmate didn't know exactly why the decision was made but since he was aware of our renovation plans he decided to share the story.

Providing an attractive facility in which to welcome and engage today's young families is another reason we have committed to the Capital Campaign.

And I close with a scene from my daughter Maya's bedroom. At night, after reading stories, she crawls into bed and we sing a few songs before she falls asleep. Normally it is a mix of childhood classics and Disney tunes. But earlier this week she had a special request, to sing her favorite Passover songs. As she enthusiastically joined in to "The Frog Song" and "Where is Baby Moses?" it was clear that for her being Jewish is fun, an emotion she and her older sister Yael echo each Saturday

when they excitedly ask if tomorrow is "Jewish school."

It is at Temple Beth EI that my daughters have acquired a collection of people they lovingly refer to as "friend," "aunt," and "silly guy." It is here that they have learned to love Judaism. God willing, it is here that they will grow up, become Bat Mitzvah, and be confirmed.

And so it is also for them that Andrea and I are supporting the capital campaign, that our daughters and their friends should have a place to learn, worship, play and celebrate, a place that they love, that they are proud of, and to which they look forward to coming.

Our commitment of \$2,500 is far less than many families have generously pledged. It is also, I recognize, a pledge that is beyond the means of some of the other families in the congregation. It is what we can afford. It is an investment we happily make in the future of Jewish life in Pensacola.

As the time quickly approaches at which decisions will have to be made about the scale and scope of the upcoming renovations, I urge all those who have not yet done so, to consider the reasons why your family supports the renovation efforts and I ask you to match what Andrea and I have done – giving what you can to support this important cause.

From the President

Friends, as our Passover seder memories fade, we are fast approaching our annual congregational meeting on May 18th. It will be a special time for the entire congregation. We will be receiving the latest information on the status of the Temple renovation as well as the status of how close we are to achieving our goal of obtaining \$1.6 million in commitments. I can only tell you that as of today (22 April) we are at the \$1.45+ million mark. There is no doubt that we will go ahead with the renovation. How much we are able to do will be entirely dependent upon reaching our goal. I can assure you that we are in the good hands of our renovation and capital campaign committees who have years of service to our Temple, business acumen and contracting experience. We are also in the good hands of our new architect Quina Grundhoefer and Bill Greenhut will guide the construction efforts. Matt Dannheisser and Rodney Rich will provide you with the renovation overview at the meeting. I encourage you to make every effort to commit what support you can afford to give now. You may also chose to make your commitment over a 5 year period. What we are looking for is a commitment to the renovation from every member of the congregation who can afford to give.

Copies of the Long Range Plan will be available to our members and Ray Engel, who headed the long range plan task force, will review the plan with you. Matt will present the Temple Budget for the forthcoming year, and Janet Kahn will present the recommendations of the Board for changes to the Temple bylaws. The nominations committee will present nominations for election to the Board of Directors. There will be reports from the officers of the congregation. In all of these activities if you come home after the meeting with questions, feel free to contact me, board members or committee chairs. Please remember that our board meetings are at 5:45 pm on the third Thursday of every month (except May) and you are invited to attend.

A package will be sent to each member to provide advance copies of the agenda, budget, bylaws changes and report of the nomination committee along with a copy of last year's minutes.

I am reminded of the quotation from Deuteronomy **Rabbah (I:10) that "a com**munity is too heavy for **anyone to carry alone."** Committees are the essential element in any congregational governance. Many of our committee chairs and members have been conducting a labor of love and diligence for the sake

of their Temple for many years. Now they are advancing in age and choosing to move to various care facilities, leaving the committees they once populated devoid of members. We rely on committee members with their energy, commitment, good will and expertise to create an effective and welcoming spiritual and communal institution. In my judgment they are at once the core of maintaining the welcoming environment that fosters growth; and they represent the next tier of Temple leadership. When we meet on May 18th there will be sign-up lists for committees. I am hopeful you will exercise your prerogative and join a committee to add your creativity and share ideas. I know that the Rabbi preaches and I don't need to. but I need your help to sustain this wonderful congregation that we all love so dearly for the years ahead.

Kitchen Kibbitz by Janet Schilling

As I sit in my 80 degree house waiting for the air conditioner repairman, I am reminded that Spring in Pensacola is very short-lived. I hope I appreciated the lovely days in the low 70's with little humidity that allowed open windows! Now all that is coming in is the heat and pollen and did I mention the heat??? But that means that blueberry season is right around the corner. I was so disappointed last year when I found that my favorite place to pick berries would not have a crop. So I have fingers crossed for this season. I am looking forward to cobblers, muffins, pies and jam. But the first thing I usually make when we get those berries home are blueberry pancakes. We pick early in the morning and if we can keep ourselves from stopping along Highway 29 for breakfast on the way home, we will light up the griddle and enjoy

the freshest berries in the best tasting pancake recipe I have found. The addition of ricotta cheese gives them a wonderful texture and the addition of orange juice gives them extra flavor. Enjoy!

Blueberry Ricotta Pancakes 1 1/2 c. all purpose flour 1 tsp. baking powder 1/4 tsp. baking soda 1/4 tsp. salt 1 1/2 Tbsp. sugar 4 Tbsp. melted butter 1/2 c. ricotta cheese 1 large egg 1/2 c. orange juice 1/3 c. milk 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract 3/4 cup fresh blueberries 1 to 2 tsp. finely grated orange zest Oil for cooking In a bowl, combine the flour with the baking power, soda, salt, and sugar. In another bowl, whisk together the butter, ricotta cheese, egg, orange juice, milk and vanilla. Combine the wet and dry ingredients just until blended. Gently stir in the blueberries and orange zest.

Wipe griddle or pan with oil or alternatively use cooking spray. Spoon a small amount of batter into the hot skillet and spread gently with the back of a spoon. Cook until golden and air bubbles have burst on surface. Flip and continue cooking until golden. Serve with syrup. Serves 4.

Educator's Message: Pre-Passover Adventures



In preparation for Passover, the School for Jewish Living students participated in some fun and delectable adventures. On Saturday April 19, ten students in 4th grade and up participated in

a Passover themed geocache at Shoreline Park in Gulf Breeze. Led by our ISJL fellow Elaine Barenblat, the youth used a geocache GPS to locate Passover items hidden in the woods. Once all the items were found, Elaine reviewed the significance of each item to Passover. Following the geocache, the group headed over to Rabbi Joel's and Andrea's home for dinner, Havdalah, s'mores, and an outdoor screening of the movie Prince of Egypt.

The next morning at Religious School all students participated in a Passover seder - chocolate style. Back for a second time by popular demand, the chocolate seder follows all the steps of a Passover seder, with the ritual items replaced by chocolate versions. Instead of maror, we eat bitter chocolate; charoset is a mixture of chocolate, coconut, nuts; a chocolate egg is used; a marshmallow represents the shankbone; karpas is strawberries dipped in chocolate; and of course we spread chocolate on Matzah. This year for the afikoman, Elaine led the students on a hunt around the Temple. Rather than one piece of Matzah, the students were charged with finding 24 afikoman puzzle pieces and assembling them to reveal a special message.

Special thanks to Elaine and all the parents who helped make these two pre-Passover adventures fun for all.
