From the Rabbi

As parents are wont to do, my mother had a habit of telling stories over and over again.

Judged by frequency, one of her favorite stories centered on her grandparents' synagogue being damaged in a fire and the kindness that followed.

The synagogue, really more of a shtieblach – a small storefront space in which the Jews from the surrounding Philadelphia neighborhood would gather to pray, was damaged when an adjacent business caught fire.

Funds were raised to repair the damage but while the work was being done the community would be displaced. The modest immigrant congregation couldn't afford to rent a temporary space. Thankfully a Catholic School a few blocks over offered use of their facilities. My mom loved to describe how each Friday afternoon the nuns, in order to make sure the congregation felt comfortable in their temporary home, would go around the building removing crucifixes. Following close behind was a cadre of synagogue leaders setting out prayer books and readying the space for Shabbat.

These events clearly left an impression on my mother, one she wished to share with her children. Looking back I think this may in part be because the kindness illustrated by the nuns was so discordant with the anti-Semitic encounters she had with some of the school's

students. But more than anything, I think the nuns' benevolence was proof that though communities of faith may hold different beliefs, at their best they are supportive of one another.

Though the circumstances are radically different than those that befell my great grandparents' congregation, our Temple community will be without use of our regular prayer space throughout the summer. As is our custom during the spring and summer, there will be weeks when we have Shabbat services outside, with our next "Shabbat Under the Stars" slated for May 15 at the home of Fred and Brenda Vigodsky. But as renovations and improvements to the sanctuary will take several months, worshipping "al-fresco" on a weekly basis is not an option.

Thankfully, our neighbors and friends at the First United Methodist Church have offered us a home during construction. Beginning May 1, unless otherwise noted, our weekly Shabbat evening worship will be held at the First United Methodist Church's Wesley Abbey (Icon) Chapel. This room, located in the building closest to the corner of Palafox and Wright Street (Governor Perry Home), is a very "neutral" and welcoming space that will allow for the casual prayer experience we are accustomed to with summer services.

As in past summers, services will begin at 6pm and will be followed by a covered dish dinner. We will be transi-

tioning to this new schedule the same time as our move on May 1.

We are incredibly grateful to Rev. Scott Grantland, Brett Ralston, and the entire First United Methodist Church community for their exceptionally warm and generous hospitality. Like the nuns in my mother's story, they are going above and beyond to make sure we feel welcome in our temporary home.

If you have friends or family who are part of the FUMC community, please extend a heartfelt thank you on behalf of the Temple. And of course as guests, we will do all we can to be worthy of First United Methodist Church's hospitality.

From the President

In about seventeen days after you receive this bulletin, we will gather to select new leadership for our Temple governance that will span the next two years. In that time we will see the completion of our renovation and the occupation of a Temple campus that will be welcoming to both current and future members as well as being accessible for all. But that is just a part of our future. Common sense dictates that we step beyond the physical campus to engage our Rabbi and each other in seeking the future path of our congregation. After all this is a holy endeavor and we are a holy people. We will need our members to step forward and to participate in this discourse. No leadership operates in a vacuum. Rather our direction is determined by the leadership asking the membership to continuously define their perception of what they want in their Temple. Sometimes this is done when the issues are both close and personal. Perhaps a better way to describe our actions is to determine the priority we each have for the functions that are carried out in the Temple. Some of us come to the temple to pray and participate in our family's lifecycle events. Others come to socialize with our Reform Jewish community. Both have relevance to us as individuals. What we have to understand that they are not separate, but part of the whole we call Judaism. As in

ancient times the whole house of Israel prayed together, they also socialized together. An example of that need to act as a holy family, is the necessity for us to step forward and join in the development and business of Temple Beth El community life. We need to give our children a sense of community and Jewish identity, our younger members an acknowledgement that we are Jews wherever Jews gather. To the rest of us that community has to include identification with Israel. Whether you like or dislike the variety of governments, the State of Israel remains the bedrock of our worldwide Jewish community.

To ask people to participate in Temple life is what all presidents do. Yet it is not the grand and great projects and task forces that command our sense of belonging, but rather that we were there and did our share to ensure the success of our Temple. The other day I read an excerpt in the Wall Street Journal from a speech that Teddy Roosevelt gave at the Sorbonne in **Paris in 1910. He said "It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly, who errs, who comes up short time**

and time again, because there is no effort without error and shortcomings; but who does actually strive to do the deeds, who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement and who at the worst, if he fails at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who know **neither victory or defeat."**

Make no mistake my friends, when the construction is over we will be at the beginning of a new era in the history of Temple Beth El. Your help is needed and in helping you are engaged in a holy endeavor insuring the continuity and future of Reform Judaism here in the greater Pensacola area.

A Spot of Tea History

Anna, the 7th Duchess of Bedford is often credited with the invention of the tradition of afternoon tea in the early 1840's. Traditionally dinner was not served until 8:30 or 9:00 in the evening and the Duchess often became hungry, especially in the summer when dinner was served even later. She ordered a small meal of bread, butter, and other niceties, such as cakes, tarts, and biscuits, to be brought secretly to her boudoir. When she was exposed she was not ridiculed, as she had feared, but her habit caught on and the concept of a small meal, of niceties and perhaps tea, became popular and eventually known as "afternoon tea". Obviously the origins of the well known British tradition of afternoon tea cannot be credited to only one woman, but evolved over a period of time, as many cultural customs do.

There are many ways to serve and enjoy tea. Asia, where tea was first discovered, has its own unique traditions of serving tea. In China, tea serving customs are used frequently for occasions like family gatherings, weddings, and for simply showing respect or offering apologies. In China, Yixing teapots are very common for serving tea. Over time, this type teapot absorbs the flavors and essence of the teas that are brewed inside it. This seasoning effect enhances the taste of the tea, cup after cup. In Japan, cast iron teapots are typically used for serving tea, and also will acquire a seasoned coating after prolonged use.

Kitchen Kibbitz by Janet Schilling

Last month I got a call from my dear friend, Ann Schops. She was calling to tell me that she thought of me every morning. I was very flattered and while I was glowing with her admiration, she continued that the reason was because she drank her morning coffee from a mug I had given her so many years ago that neither of us could remember exactly when. Then the sadness crept into her voice and before she could say it, I knew what was coming. Unfortunately, she had broken the cup. I told her I was glad that she had gotten so many years out of it, though that did not seem to make her feel much better. I knew I wanted to replace it, but I was not certain that it would still be available. So I called Congregation Mickve Israel in Savannah. When Jordan was in college, we had the opportunity to tour the Temple, and it was there that I found the gift for Ann. Sometimes it is good to invest in a classic. The mug was the standard **co-balt blue variety with the Temple's logo on it** and yes, it was still available! Apparently, **it is the perfect size for Ann's Keurig coffeemaker.** I loved the look on her face when she opened my gift. I was going to share a recipe from the Mickve Israel cookbook which I bought for myself when I got **Ann's mug.** But as I was looking for that book, I came across our Temple's "Kitchen Symphony III" and was curious to see if

there might be a recipe from Ann. The first one that I found was for a stewed chicken that was very similar to the way my mother used to make it. So Ann, I am glad you have your mug back and I am glad I can recreate a stewed chicken like I grew up eating! We both win!

Ann Schops' Yankee Stewed

Chicken
2 1/2-3 1/2 lb. chicken
1/4 c. flour
1/4-1/2 c. Mazola oil
3 onions, cut up
1/4 c. green pepper, cut up
1-8 oz. can tomato sauce
1 Tbsp. catsup
2 tsp. Lea & Perrins Worcestershire sauce
Cut up the chicken and season well with salt and pepper. Let stand about 1/2 hour. Coat all pieces of chicken with flour. Brown in oil in an iron pot. Remove chicken and brown onions and green pepper in same pot. Add tomato sauce, chicken, catsup, Worcestershire sauce and 1/2 can of water. Let simmer, partly covered, until chicken is tender. This should take about 1 hour. Add water if necessary. Serve with rice. Freezes well.
