The Bienniel is where Jews gather to learn, pray, share ideas, dance and sing, hear from inspiring guest speakers, reunite with old friends, make new connections, and re-imagine Jewish life.

From the Rabbi

Two Vignettes of Community (or Why I Love Being a Rabbi)

By the time the blast of Tekiah Gedolah fades from the sanctuary at the close of Yom Kippur, I, like many in the congregation, am exhausted physically and mentally. This year, however, the exhaustion did not last long. My "batteries" were quickly recharged by energy that filled our Temple community. Below are just two vignettes of the special and sacred moments that took place the week following Yom Kippur.

Vignette 1
There aren't many places
in the modern world
where adults and children,
at least those not related
to one another, interact in
a meaningful way. The
morning after Yom Kippur
the Temple Beth El parking
lot became one of those
rare places.

The Temple Brotherhood

arrived early to assemble metal poles into the frame of a sukkah and to cut the palm fronds that would serve as the schach – the temporary shelter's roof. Just as soon as the sharp tools were put away, students from the School for Jewish Living began to arrive. Some joined the Brotherhood in affixing the Sukkah's mesh walls. Others got to work creating

decorations for the Sukkah. With the day growing ever warmer, most of the kids and adults retired to the air conditioned comfort of the social hall where they enjoyed a hot dog lunch, prepared on the Brotherhood's new grill. As they dined, a few hearty souls stayed outside to add the roof and hang decorations.

At high noon an unusual collection of school-aged children and middle-aged men assembled in the parking lot. They put the final touches on the sukkah and then stepped back to appreciate the finished product. Looking at the group, there were youthful heads of long, flowing hair and the bare scalps that come with age, bodies bouncing with the inexhaustible energy of youth, and those, like my own, keen for a nap. But for all their differences. those assembled had come together for shared purposes: to build a sukkah, to spend time with friends, to celebrate Jewish life. Though difficult to explain. all of these things seemed more worthwhile because they had been done one generation with another.

Vignette 2
Early on a Wednesday afternoon a group of men gathered at Barrancas National Cemetery. They were there for the funeral of someone they had never met. In fact, even after ar-

riving there was little they would learn of the deceased, aside from the individual's name, place of birth, rank, branch of service, and that he was Jewish. Still they came to offer this unknown individual a dignified burial. In coming, they affirmed the value that Judaism places on all humanity; all of us are created B'tzelem Eloheim — in the image of God.

A funeral in which no one is there to eulogize or share memories of the deceased is horribly tragic. But as I left the cemetery my feelings of sadness were mixed with pride. It is a true honor to be part of a community of such fine individuals and to share a tradition that inspires such acts of kindness.

A Tribute to a Friend.....

Last month we said goodbye to our dear friend Herman. Many of you may not know this, but Herman and I shared a connection beyond the Temple. We both attended Atlantic City High School! As a matter of fact, Herman walked the halls of ACHS with my mother. We often spent time talking about the restaurants we both enjoyed in Atlantic City which stood the test of time. And we both agreed that the cheesecake could not be beat at Shumsky's. The recipe I am including this month is not Shumsky's original, but is my favorite cheesecake and I am sure Herman would not object. I will miss our conversations and his gentle manner. May his memory be for a blessing.

Basic Cheesecake from Ina Garten

For the Crust

- 1 1/2 c. graham cracker crumbs (10 crackers)
- 1 Tbsp. sugar
- 6 Tbsp (3/4 stick) unsalted butter, melted

For the Filling

- 2 1/2 lbs cream cheese at room temperature
- 1 1/2 c. sugar
- 5 large eggs at room temperature

2 egg yolks at room temperature 1/4 c. sour cream

- 1 Tbsp. grated lemon zest (from 2 lemons)
- 1 1/2 tsp. pure vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. To make the crust, combine the graham crackers, sugar, and melted butter until moistened. Pour into a 9-inch springform pan. With your hands, pres the crumbs into the bottom of the pan and about 1 inch up the sides. Bake for 8 minutes. Cool to room temperature.

Raise oven temperature to 400 degrees.

To make the filling, cream the cream cheese and sugar in the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with a paddle attachment on medium-high speed until light and fluffy, about 5 minutes. Reduce the speed of the mixer to medium and add the eggs and egg yolks, two at a time, mixing well. Scrape down the bowl as necessary. With the mixer on low, add the sour cream, lemon zest, and vanilla. Mix thoroughly and pour into the cooled crust.

Bake for 15 minutes. Turn the oven temperature down to 225 degrees and bake for another 1 hour and 15 minutes. Turn the oven off and open the door wide. The cake will not be completely set in the center. Allow the cake to sit in the oven with the door open for 30 minutes. Take the cake out of the oven and allow it to sit at room temperature for another 2 to 3 hours until completely cooled. Wrap and refrigerate overnight. Remove the cake from the springform pan by carefully running a hot knife around the outside of the cake. Leave the cake on the bottom of the springform pan for serving on a platter.

Serves 12-15

Ina's note: The quintessential cheese-cake; creamy but light with vanilla and lemon undertones. Amazingly, it doesn't crack in the middle!

Janet's note: It really does NOT crack!!! Looks beautiful even untopped, but can be topped with fruit or glaze of your choice.
