Temple Beth El is going to Israel and we want you to join us! Together we will visit Jerusalem, the Dead Sea, Tel Aviv, Haifa, Tsfat, Tiberias, and many other great Israeli destinations. Led by Rabbi Joel and Andrea Fleekop, we will tour via luxury bus, accompanied by a licensed tour guide.

The projected group rate is \$3,659* including round trip airfare, four star hotel accommodations (double occupancy), Israeli breakfast daily, buffet lunch at the Dead Sea, and four special group dinners. For those wishing to arrange their own airfare, the land only option is projected at \$2,899.

Temple Beth El Cemetery Perpetual Care Fees

Temple Beth El does not have a "burial fee". Instead, the bylaws adopt a system based on a Perpetual Care Fee. According to the bylaws, Article VIII Section 2e, the Perpetual Care Fund must produce sufficient earnings to cover all expenses associated with operating and maintaining the Temple Beth El cemetery. Based on the need to increase fees to cover the costs, the Board of Directors approved the following fees to become effective Jan. 1, 2015.

Regular Members if purchased prior to death: \$3000
Regular Members if purchased after death: Perpetual Care Fee plus 50% = \$4500
Non-Members but eligible for Regular Membership: Perpetual Care Fee plus 150% = \$7500

Each subscription to the Perpetual Care Fund shall cover one gravesite. This does not affect previously purchased Perpetual Care, including those covering lots, rather than individual gravesites. **The Perpetual Care Fee may be paid "in full" or in installments** over a period of time not exceeding five years provided the initial installment is not less than 20% of the total Perpetual Care Fee.

Release Party

Despite the ongoing threat of ISIS in the Middle East, raging forest fires in the West, and a series of appalling stories involving NFL players, last month the media **dedicated an entire day's** worth of news coverage **to the release of Apple's** newest iPhone.

Apparently, it was airtime well spent. In the first 24 hours after the new product announcement on September 9, more than four million people pre-ordered phones. Even more astounding were those who immediately packed their bags and started camping outside Apple stores – hoping to be among the first to get their hands on one of the devices once live sales officially began on the 19th.

I often wonder about these people. Do they have jobs or families? What makes them think that getting the newest phone a few weeks before their neighbors justifies camping out on the sidewalk for ten days?

My guess is that, with the exception of the tech **bloggers, it isn't really** about being first but about being part of an

experience. Like album release parties of decades past, it is about sharing something you are passionate about with like-minded individuals.

On Wednesday October 15th at 6:00 pm Temple Beth El will be hosting a release party of our own. Amidst singing and dancing, surrounded by fans with literally a religious zeal, we will release the 5775 version of the Torah.

If you come to our celebration of Simchat Torah as well as other opportunities when the Torah will be read and studied during the year I think you will be amazed to see how many changes there are in this **year's version. It is full of** new understandings, explanations, and insights.

The reading of Torah version 5775 will be very **different than last year's, but** unlike the new iPhone, the **changes aren't in the** product, they are in us. Torah study is a dialogue between us and the text. As long as we continue to grow and change from year to year, so too will the conversation we have **with our faith's holiest** book.

Mishnah Pirkei Avot, 1:25 records the teaching of Rabbi Ben Bag-Bag. “He

used to say of the Torah: Turn it and turn it again, for everything is in it. Pore over it, and wax gray and **old over it.”**

If we do as Rabbi Ben Bag-Bag urges, if we continue to turn, year after year, through the ancient and eternal words of the Torah, we will never exhaust the depth of its meaning.

I hope you take the time to explore all that is new **in this year's version of** the Torah.

From the President

The Days of Awe have arrived and the end of the celebrations will signal the beginning of our forthcoming renovations to our Temple campus. It will make our Temple more accommodating to those with disabilities and more welcoming to our Reform Jewish community. Everyone should be excited. You have spoken to us through surveys, meetings and one-on-one fact finding sessions and we have heard you. It can be said that this New Year is one of a new beginning for each of us and as a Temple family.

We should feel great pride in the accomplishments of the School for Jewish Living. We can look to the future with confidence that there will be a Reform Jewish community here in Pensacola. Much credit must go to our Director, Andrea Fleekop and our teachers. As our director of the School of Jewish Living, she represents our first professional educator, and our educational program reflects that degree of skilled excellence.

We are fortunate enough to have a young and brilliantly gifted Rabbi who has captured not only our hearts, but has moved our Congregation closer to the mainstream of Reform Judaism. We have recently captured him with a new five year contract that will extend his spiritual leadership until June of 2020. We are growing in the number of young families and young members. There is a recognition and emphasis on welcoming interfaith families to our congregation. We stand at 156 member units. There are more adult education and Torah study programs than ever in our long history. The Rabbi has established outreach pro-

grams with the Torah On Tap and Young Jewish Pensacola programs. These have drawn many non-affiliated young Jews into the Pensacola Jewish community. Our Shabbat summer worship services drew large numbers, due in part to the warmth of the service and the fellowship of breaking bread together. The Congregation can boast of a very active Sisterhood and an active Brotherhood. We have at each time when confronted with an opportunity seized the moment.

Early last year we gathered a group of members under the leadership of Matt Dannheisser and Rodney Rich to review all of the requirements we had received from our membership on what they wanted to make our Temple campus warm and welcoming, as well as accommodating members with disabilities. In the months that followed, we have hired an architect and Bill Greenhut has agreed to be our general contractor. Plans have been discussed with the congregation and in committee. We now have a set of plans that can be used to cost-out the project. The Renovation Committee hopes to meet all of our basic requirements within our budget, the beginning the renovation is planned for a late October timeframe, with an eye to completion sometime in the late spring. Nothing at this point is hard. We are still working to mate the plans with the funds we have available. The generosity of our Temple membership is nothing short of a miracle. Our pledges so far have reached \$2M. I might add that we are close, but not enough, by our calculations, to do the entire job. I hope that those who have not given to the

renovation will do so now, so that we can complete the entire project. We are so close and yet so far. We need your help now! We are certainly at a time of new beginnings. The Temple needs not only your financial support but equally important your service. Now is the time to consider what you want this Temple to be and how it should serve you. Volunteer commitments are needed in a variety of committees and task forces that address specific projects. Our communal life as a congregation is dependent upon your efforts to influence the atmosphere and direction of our congregation. In all honesty, we get there, by commitment, sacrifice, time, effort, energy and money? After all no one said doing G-d's work here in Pensacola was going to be either easy or quick. Yet, I believe that if you consider for a moment what we have been given, you will also recognize as Jews how fortunate we have been to seize the opportunity to do G-d's work.

I am very fond of a quote by Albert Schweitzer from 1936. He said: **"We are born of other lives....We possess the capabilities to bring all other lives into existence. So nature compels us to recognize the fact of mutual dependence, each life necessarily helping the other lives which are linked to it."**

As we begin the High Holy Days, know in your heart, in all that you do for your Temple, that you are a messenger of G-d.

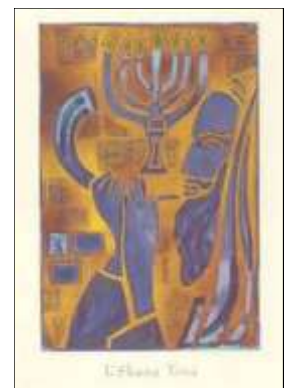

Educator's Message: Better Together

On Sunday, September 21 the Sisterhood and the School for Jewish Living joined together for morning of learning, eating, talking, and engaging in a Tzedakah project. Serving as the School Director and Co-Program Chair for Sisterhood, it was a natural idea for me to plan a meeting of these two groups within our Temple. The reviews are in; and it was a huge success!

At 11:15am Rabbi Joel led an interactive presentation on High Holiday Customs Around the World for Sisterhood and students in grades fifth through Confirmation. Sitting at mixed tables, the ladies and students spoke to each other and shared a family style meal. At noon, the younger students joined the group and everyone participated in making Rosh Hashanah care-packages (cards, apples and honey) for a community non-profit 90W. **Afterwards one student remarked, "It was nice to meet and talk to some of the adults at Temple."**



I believe it is very important for the leaders and adult members of our Temple to interact with our students for several reasons. First, the adults (most of whom have grown children and some even grown grandchildren) can (re)experience the importance of Jewish education. Our leaders must be **in touch with today's young families, for they are the future of Temple Beth El.** Second, the children gain the benefit of meeting some of the adults in our community and in turn feel more comfortable at Temple. Third, seeing adult role models actively engaged in our Temple demonstrates the value of lifelong learning and commitment to Judaism.

Our Temple serves many generations. Often our programs are designed to focus on a specific population. This recent joint-event once again proves the value of creating some pre-planned intergenerational programming.

I hope you will join us for our next intergenerational program—the joint Brotherhood and School for Jewish Living **"Building, Decorating, and Eating in the Sukkah"** on Sunday, October 5 at 10am.

A Healthier Pancake

Can a pancake ever be healthy? Made with flour, eggs, butter and favorite fillings, not to mention a good dousing with maple syrup, I was not sure I wanted to sacrifice taste for my arteries! A favorite teacher at school who shares my love of food (and especially trying to find healthy alternatives) told me about an oatmeal pancake recipe that is a favorite of hers. When she mentioned oatmeal and pancake in the same breath, I almost walked out of the room. I had a flashback to **when my brother told me about "the best pancakes he had ever eaten."** He shared his recipe with me. I made them once and then used the recipe and what was left of the pancakes for kindling. My teacher friend assured me that she had never made these pancakes without receiving a request for the recipe. So I thought I would give oatmeal pancakes one more try. I was glad I did. If you prefer a light and fluffy pancake, this recipe may not be for you. But if you are willing to experiment, I think you will find them to be a nice change of pace. Now that the weather has gotten cooler, they are a wonderful breakfast or even dinner option. Add a link or two of chicken apple sausage and some fresh fruit and you will have a meal that will keep you satis-

fied. I am also sharing a smoothie recipe that Logan and I have been drinking for about a month. It too will keep you full and keep you from snacking between meals. Filled with nuts and gluten-free, it was designed as a detox and as a way to reset your taste buds. We liked it so much we have gone way past the recommended ten days! I hope you enjoy both recipes.

Sally's Oatmeal Pancakes

2 c. old fashioned oatmeal
2 c. non-fat buttermilk (I use almond milk unsweetened with a Tbsp. of vinegar)
2 large eggs
4 Tbsp. butter melted
1/2 c. flour
2 Tbsp. sugar
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp salt
Chopped pecans to taste
1/3-1/2 c. unsweetened flaked coconut

Combine oats and buttermilk. Cover and refrigerate overnight or at least 2 hours.

Add eggs and melted butter to oat mixture. Sift all dry ingredients and add to oat mixture. Spray heated griddle with cooking spray. Ladle batter in 1/4 c. measurement and use

back of ladle to spread out batter. I use an ice cream scoop to make this easier. Bake until golden brown about 3-5 minutes per side. Makes about 24 pancakes. Leftovers freeze well and can be reheated in a toaster oven.

Favorite Nut Smoothie

2 Brazil nuts
4 walnut halves
1 Tbsp. Chia seeds
1 Tbsp. hemp powder
1 Tbsp. pumpkin or sunflower seeds
1 Tbsp. almond butter
1/2 Tbsp. coconut oil
1/4 avocado
1/2 c. blueberries
1/2 c. water
1/2 c. almond milk (unsweetened)
Combine chia seeds with water and let soak overnight.

In the morning add mixture to all other ingredients in a blender.

If you like it very cold, add a bit of crushed ice.

The fruit component can be varied. I have used banana, strawberries, raspberries, etc. You may find that the flavor is a bit bland. I do also add a bit of vanilla or almond extract, but the original recipe does not call for it. Makes one 16 oz. smoothie.

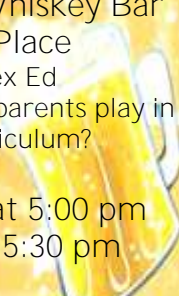
