

# From the Rabbi

Sins that Sleep with the Fishes

Beautiful music, poetic readings, and the powerful imagery of the holiday prayers are all part of what makes the High Holy Days so special. Fittingly, it is these elements that dominate our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur observance. But in addition to these "high expressions" of religion, our tradition recognizes that there is also a need, in our holiday observance, for something tangible.

It is perhaps from this awareness that the custom of Tashlich developed. Tashlich, which means to "cast away" is a brief ritual whose central element involves throwing an object, traditionally bread, into a body of water. The object, which is carried away or sinks into the water, is a metaphor for the sins we hope to cast away during the High Holy Days through the work of teshuvah, repentance. Tashlich is traditionally held on Rosh Hashanah afternoon.

The ritual of Tashlich, as well as its name, are derived from the closing verses in the Book of Micah. Depicting a compassionate and forgiving God, Micah 7:18-20 describes the casting of sins into the depths of the sea.

Unlike many other aspects of our High Holy Day observance, Tashlich is mentioned in neither the Mishnah nor Talmud, and likely developed as an Ashkenazic folk tradition during the Middle Ages. Theodore Gaster, a scholar of comparative religion and mythology suggests Tashlich may be a Jewish adaptation of the superstitious practice of "throwing sops to the spirits of rivers on critical days of the year.

Perhaps because of its folk origins, the custom of Tashlich was met with early rabbinic opposition. In fact, the first mention of Tashlich in rabbinic literature, found in Jacob Molin's Sefer Maharal, is a diatribe against the custom. Still today, a number of Haredi or Ultra Orthodox Jews object to the ritual.

Despite its critics, Tashlich proved widely popular and so most rabbis directed their energies not toward eliminating the ritual but rather to imbuing it with meaning.

As Tashlich is traditionally held at the banks of a natural body of water, many rabbinic teachings make metaphoric use of the fish that reside in the river. lake, or ocean. These include the notion that fish, which are without eyelids, represent God's ever-watchful eye and that just as fish are dependent on water, so too are Jews dependent on God and Torah. Another popular teaching, based on a verse from Ecclesiastes, explains that just as fish are liable to fall for bait or be caught in a net, so too must we be vigilant not to be tricked by temptation or caught in the net of sin.

Today Tashlich, which was spread by Kabbalists in the 16th century to Sephardic and Mizrachi Jews, is practiced by Jewish communities around the world. The propagation of this folk tradition has spurred many unique modifications. In Jerusalem, where there is an absence of rivers and lakes, Tashlich is held at a well. It was the custom of Kurdish Jews to cast not bread but rather themselves into the water as a way of removing their sins. Jews in New York line the bridges to toss their sins into the rivers below. And in recent years, members

of Temple Israel of Hollywood, California have adopted the custom of inscribing their sins on a wall of sand at the beach, and watching as they are erased by the crashing waves.

Whether Tashlich is a long standing part of your High Holy Day observances or something you only recently learned about, I encourage you to join us this year. I think you will discover this unique tradition to be fun and meaningful way to top off your Rosh Hashanah celebration.

Temple Beth El Cemetery Perpetual Care Fees

Temple Beth El does not have a "burial fee". Instead, the bylaws adopt a system based on a Perpetual Care Fee. According to the bylaws, Article VIII Section 2e, the Perpetual Care Fund must produce sufficient earnings to cover all expenses associated with operating and maintaining the Temple Beth El cemetery. Based on the need to increase fees to cover the costs, the Board of Directors approved the following fees to become effective Jan. 1, 2015.

Regular Members if purchased prior to death: \$3000 Regular Members if purchased after death: Perpetual Care Fee plus 50% = \$4500 Non-Members but eligible for Regular Membership: Perpetual Care Fee plus 150% = \$7500


Each subscription to the Perpetual Care Fund shall cover one gravesite. This does not affect previously purchased Perpetual Care, including those covering lots, rather than individual gravesites. The Perpetual Care Fee may be paid "in full" or in installments over a period of time not exceeding five years provided the initial installment is not less than 20% of the total Perpetual Care Fee.



Strudel Sticks
1 cup cold butter, cubed
2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 cup sour cream
1 egg, separated
1 cup peach or apricot preserves, divided
30 vanilla wafers, crushed

30 vanilla waters, crushed 1/2 cup flaked coconut 20 pecan halves GLAZE:

1/2 cup confectioners' sugar 1/8 teaspoon vanilla extract 2 to 3 teaspoons 2% milk In a large bowl, cut butter into flour until mixture resembles coarse

crumbs. Combine sour cream and egg yolk; add to flour mixture, stirring with a fork to form a soft dough. Divide in half; wrap in plastic wrap. Refrigerate several hours or overnight.

On a floured surface, roll each portion of dough into a 12-in. square. Spread with preserves. Combine crushed wafers and coconut; sprinkle over preserves. Roll up jelly-roll style; seal seam. Place seam side down on a greased baking sheet. Cut widthwise with a sharp knife three-fourths of the way through dough every 1 in. Beat egg white until foamy; brush over pastry. Place a pecan half on each slice.

Bake at 350° for 25-30 minutes or until golden brown. Combine the confectioner's sugar, vanilla and enough milk to achieve desired

consistence; drizzle over pastries. Yield: 2 pastries (10 servings each).

# **Educator's Message:**

On Sunday, August 24 the School for Jewish Living welcomed 39 students and their families to a new year of Jewish education at Temple Beth El. Smiles, hugs, and a sense of excitement filled the social hall as friends, students, and teachers reunited.

I am thrilled to welcome back returning teachers Jan Suhrbier, Renee Eilen, and Rabbi Joel Fleekop as well as new teachers Summer Boyle and Hannah Zimmern. Both Summer and Hannah grew up at Temple Beth EI, attended the School for Jewish Living, became Bat Mitzvah, Confirmed, served as teaching assistants last year, and are leaders in PARTY (our NFTY chapter). Our congregation should take great pride in their dedication to Jewish life and their desire to pay it forward.

We will continue to use the ISJL education program which consists of three components: curriculum, annual educator conference, and education fellow. This year our fellow is Lex Rofus. His first visit was Tues-Wed Aug 26-27. During his time in Pensacola Lex met with our teachers, education committee, Rabbi Joel, and other members of the Temple community.

NEW THIS YEAR: I am thrilled to share the news that we will be introducing Hebrew into our Sunday program in some exciting and innovative ways. This is based off of one of our STRATEGIC GOALS of including an element of Hebrew on Sundays, in addition to our weekly service and other experiences. In preschool the children will encounter Hebrew through song and dance. In grade K/1 children will be exposed to the Hebrew alphabet. In grades 2-4 students will learn "Hebrew Through Movement," a language acquisition strategy in which students learn Hebrew by hearing and responding to basic Hebrew commands in a playful and meaningful way. The goal is to create a positive link to Hebrew, which students will study in earnest during midweek Hebrew instruction. In grades 5-7 students will explore concepts of prayer (why we pray, types of prayers, the structure of a worship service, Jewish prayer spaces around the world...) as well as an in depth examination of primary holiday prayers and additional special blessings.

May this coming year continue to be filled with smiles, hugs, and a sense of excitement.
