From the Rabbi

Honoring the Departed, Healing Ourselves

On a Sunday morning in late August, approximately 20 members of our congregational family met to spruce up the Temple Beth El cemetery. Together we cut bushes, trimmed hedges, and performed other tasks. On one hand, it was simply a morning of yard work. On the other, it was the fulfillment of a holy mitzvah.

The rabbis teach that caring for the dead is an act of *chesed shel emet*, an act of true loving kindness. By caring for the departed and their final resting place we keep the sacred promise to cherish and respect the memories of our loved ones.

During this High Holy Day season, as we reflect back on the past, our thoughts frequently turn to friends and family who are no longer with us. Liturgically, these thoughts and feelings are given voice during the Yom Kippur Yizkor Service and the lesser-known tradition of Kever Avot.

Kever Avot means “graves of our ancestors” and refers to the tradition of visiting the burial places of friends and family in the days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. As in many communities, Tem-

ple Beth El holds a congregational Kever Avot service, during which prayers and reflections are shared. This year the service will be held on Sunday, September 20 at 1pm at the Temple Beth El Cemetery.

Following the short service there is the opportunity for individuals or families to visit the graves of relatives who may be buried in the cemetery. Having just started the New Year, this is a wonderful opportunity to think about the lessons and values our loved ones instilled in us, and how we might live and honor those values in the year to come.

Kever Avot also offers an opportunity for healing and tshuvah. Standing at the grave of a loved one we may be moved to ask for or grant forgiveness of the departed. Similarly, coming together with siblings and other family members to honor the memory of a common relative can serve as a catalyst for moving past the arguments, disagreements, and hard feelings that too often divide families.

I know that for many, Kever Avot may be a new tradition, but I strongly encourage you to make it part of your High Holy Days. Whether or not you have relatives buried at the Temple Beth El cemetery, I think you will find the ser-

vice meaningful and the opportunity to reflect of great value.

Aunt Git's Zucchini

2-3 zucchini
Small onion
3 eggs
Salt, pepper and garlic powder to taste
2 Tbsp. seasoned bread crumbs
1 Tbsp oil
Additional bread crumbs for topping

Hand-grate the zucchini and a small onion. Beat the eggs and add to the vegetables with the seasoning. Mix in the 2 Tbsp. bread crumbs and the oil. Put mixture in a greased baking pan or casserole and smooth top. Top with additional seasoned bread crumbs and bake at 350 degrees for one hour or until brown.

In my second year of studies, I participated in the Perach Project-tutoring children from underprivileged backgrounds as part of a scholarship."

Most recently, Tal has been studying Special Education and Mathematics Education and has worked as a teacher for first, second and third grades in "Tidhar" Elementary school in her home town of Afula.

Tal is excited to be bringing her love for teaching and her love for Israel to our community, and can't wait to get started. ## Safety & Security Plan

We all are aware of the violent incidents that are occurring across the United States. None of us wants to think negatively, but we all can embrace the concept of being prepared just in case. To be pro-active, Jaime Montero is organizing a Safety and Security Team for Temple Beth El to aid our congregation in reducing risks. The limited first phase of the program will be implemented in time for the High Holydays in September. It will be followed by an in-depth plan of protection for the Temple Beth El family of staff, congregants and children. The goal is to ensure that Temple Beth El is as safe as possible for everyone who comes to our facility.

### Step 1

**Jaime's team as well as the ushers for High Holyday services will be educated by security professionals about what to look for and how to react to danger. They will be guided as to where to be strategically posted for maximum observation capability and how to call for assistance in an emergency. They will quickly interact with Rabbi Fleekop to notify congregants of an emergency. They will also act as guides for the congregation's evacuation or sheltering-in-place protection procedures as per police department guidance.**

### Step 2

Evacuation signs will be printed and posted for everyone to follow.

### Step 3

Special needs congregants will be invited to sit in a designated area in the front of the sanctuary. In the event of an emergency, they **will be escorted to a "safe room" so that they do not have to struggle with evacuation.** These individuals will be contacted in advance so they are aware of preparations on their behalf.

### Step 4

Wireless equipment will be available in near future to further secure our safety with links to local authorities. Volunteer participation from the congregation has been very positive. We feel confident that our Temple family will be much safer than in the past. The full scale plan to be released in January, 2016 will encompass such topics as hazardous material storage, protection for the Sunday school, facility key policy, allergy management, youth group policies, safety inspections, and use of special medical equipment such as a defibrillator.

## Renovation Update and Tips for the High Holy Day Services

**If you drive by the Temple, you can't help but notice the progress in our renovations and new construction. The entire building project will not be complete for a number of months to come, but we've been assured our sanctuary will be ready for worship for the High Holy Days.** Please have patience, flexibility and understanding during this most sacred time. Please be mindful of the following for the High Holy Day services:

- Parking will be very limited in the Temple parking lots. There will be some spaces available on the north and east sides of the building. Enter these parking lots from Palafox St. for the north parking lot and Strong St. for the east parking lot.
- For Erev Rosh Hashana (Sunday evening Sept. 13) and Kol Nidre (Tuesday evening Sept. 22) services, you may park across Palafox St. in the parking lots of Gross and Schuster (803 N. Palafox) and Cetti and McGraw (817 N. Palafox). You may also park next door at Spencer, Meador and Johnson (900 N. Palafox) **PLEASE DO NOT PARK IN ANY OF THESE PARKING LOTS FOR DAYTIME SERVICES.**
- Parking will also be available for all services at the Days Inn and in legal parking areas on nearby streets.
- Please be careful when walking and only cross at designated street crossings.
- Access to the sanctuary will be through the Palafox St. main entrance and the Cervantes St. side entrance.
- Restrooms will be available upstairs, conveniently located just outside the south sanctuary doors.
- There will be plenty of comfortable seating available in the beautifully restored and newly cushioned pews. Extra seating is available in the balcony.
- The Max L. Bear Auditorium renovations are not yet complete, therefore we will not be able to have our traditional Rosh Hashana luncheon or Break-the-Fast meal this year.
